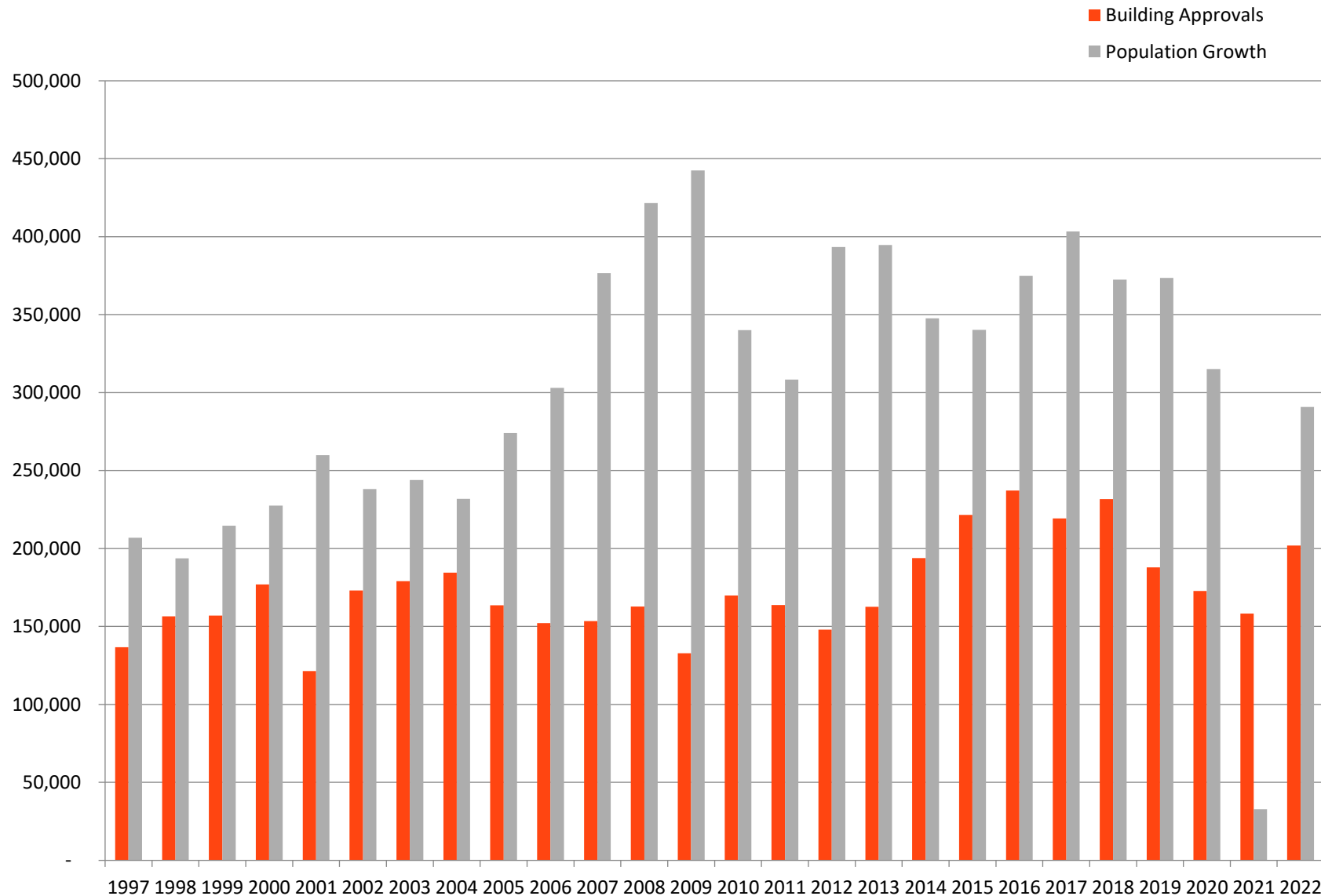

National population trends – growth bounce back after COVID

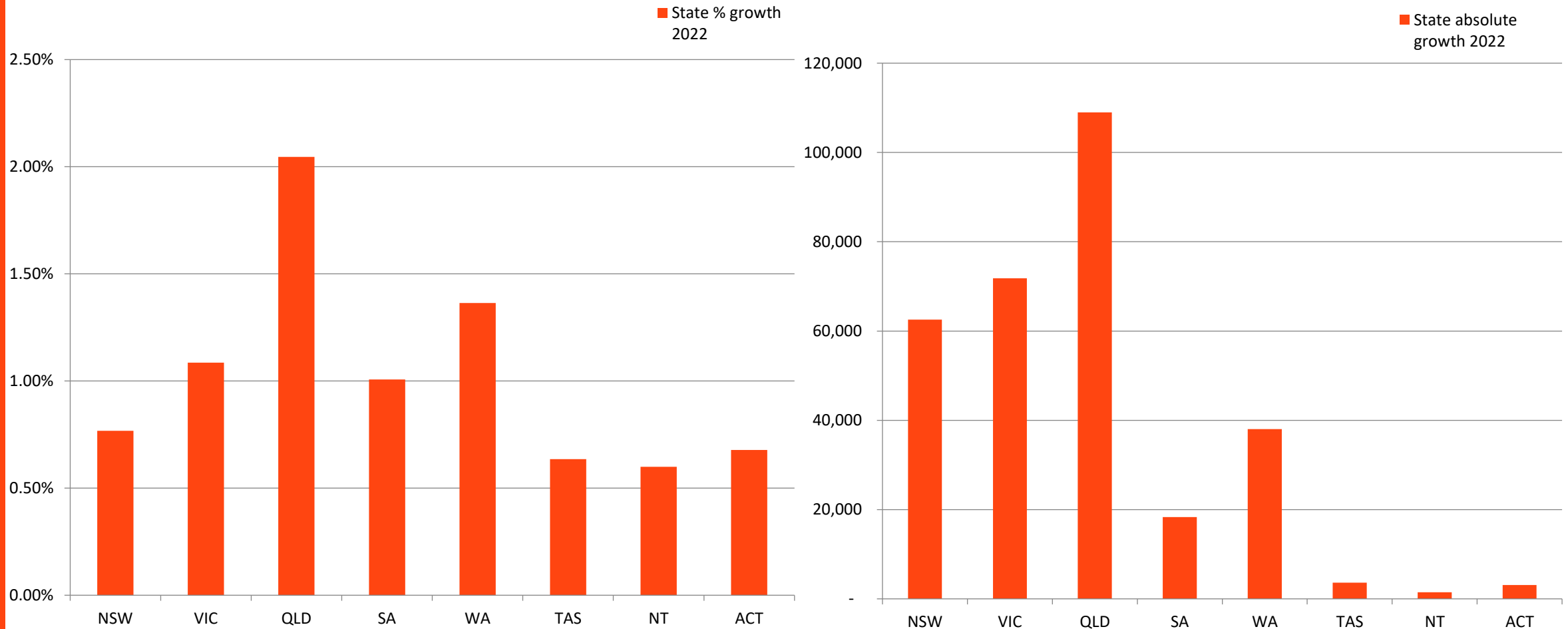


Australia ended a record period of population growth with COVID border closures. The year ended June 2021 was the lowest growth rate in over 100 years.

The growth rate for the year of 0.13% was the lowest national growth rate recorded since 1916, when the population declined due to World War I. The following year (FY 2022) saw a bounce back when the borders reopened, but still lower growth than the previous 15 years.

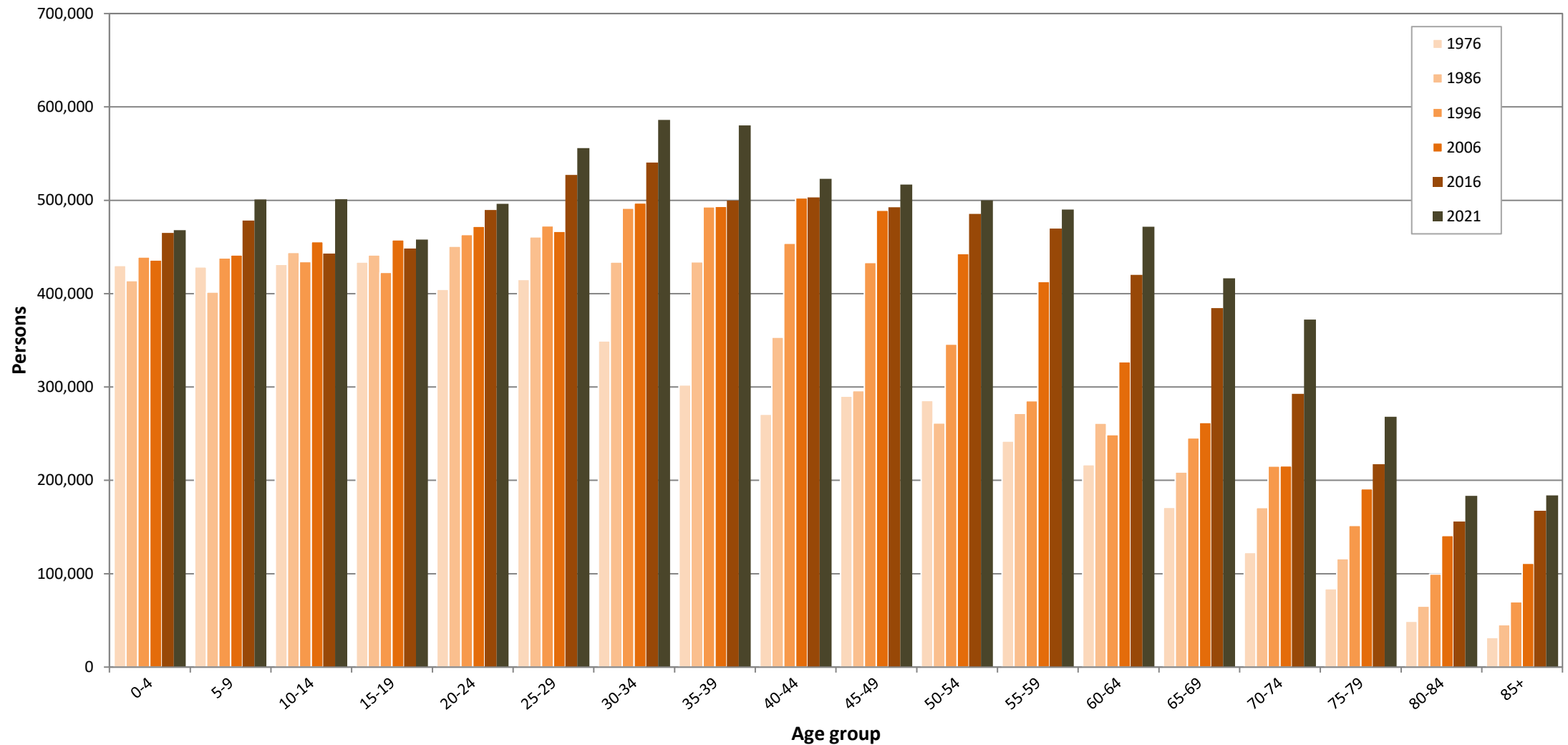
Building approvals were still quite strong however.

State population change – 2021-22 – percent and absolute



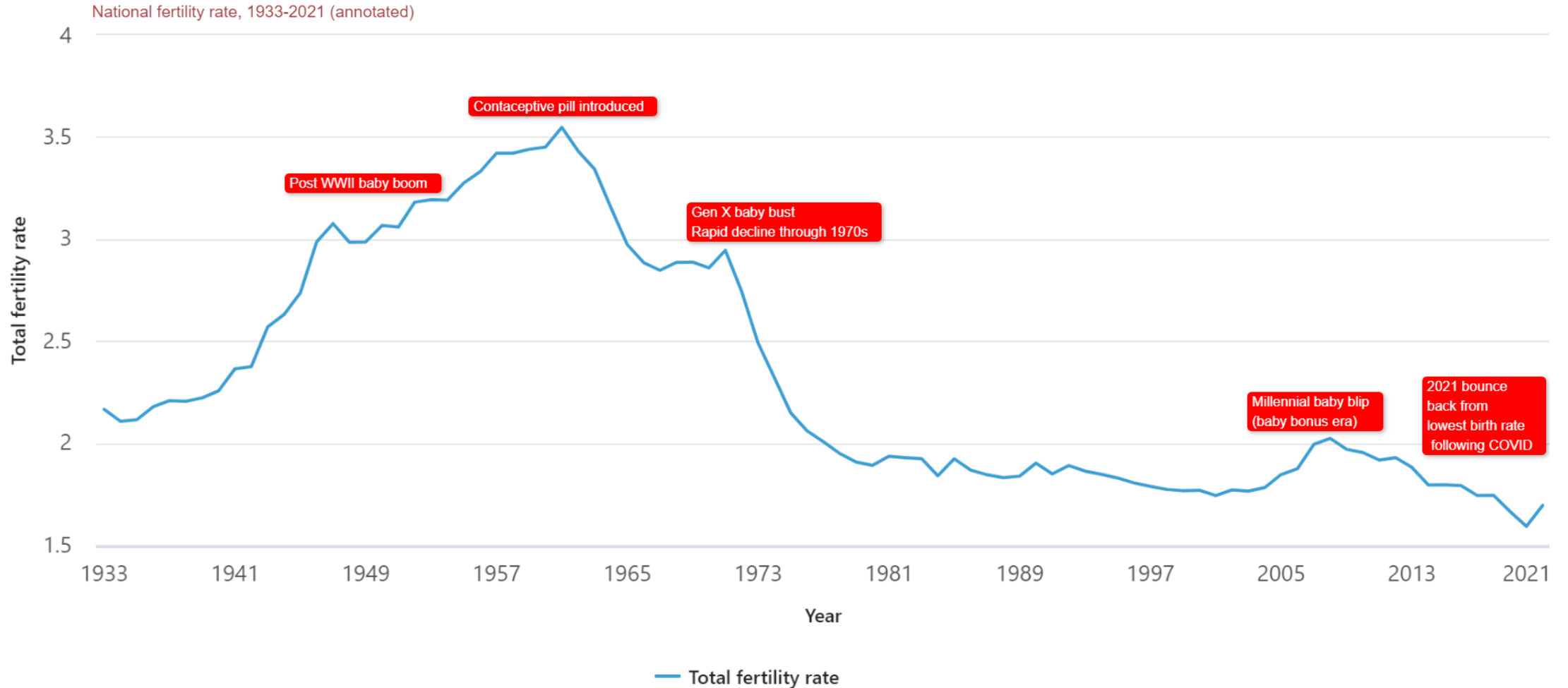
2022 saw a return to growth for all states and territories, with NSW showing a modest 0.8% growth after a flat 2021. Queensland's state growth is now far higher than any other jurisdiction.

Population by 5 year age groups across 45 years, NSW



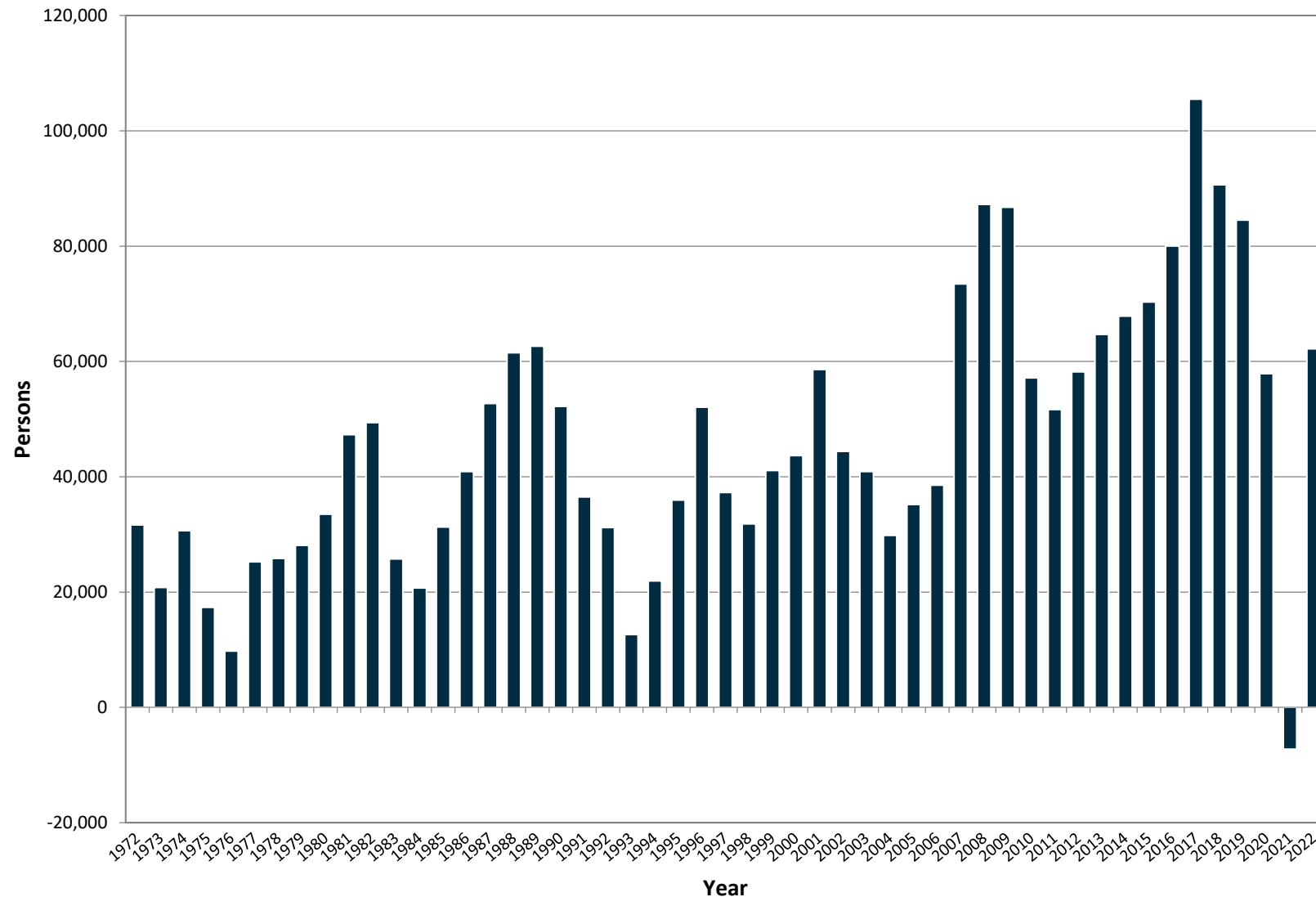
NSW median age increased by just one year between 2016-2021, from 38 to 39.

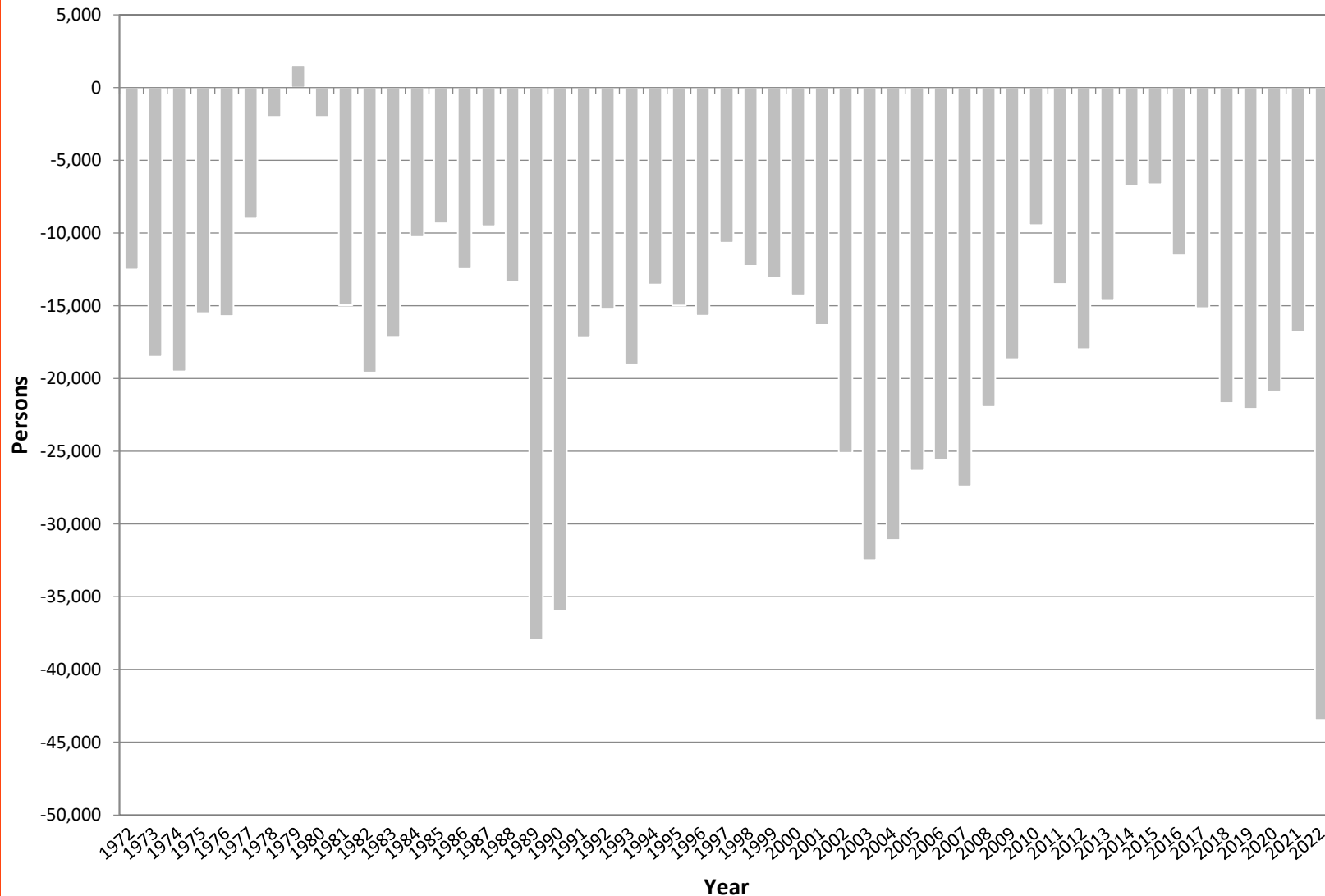
Net overseas migration – NSW, 1972-2021



Overseas migration was negative for NSW in 2020-21, but came back strongly in late 2021/early 2022 when the borders reopened, reaching 60,000 for the year, lower than the last 10 years but still fairly strong, and approximately equalling total population growth.

As parts of Sydney get most of the overseas migration, the loss of migration during the pandemic had the largest effect on these areas.

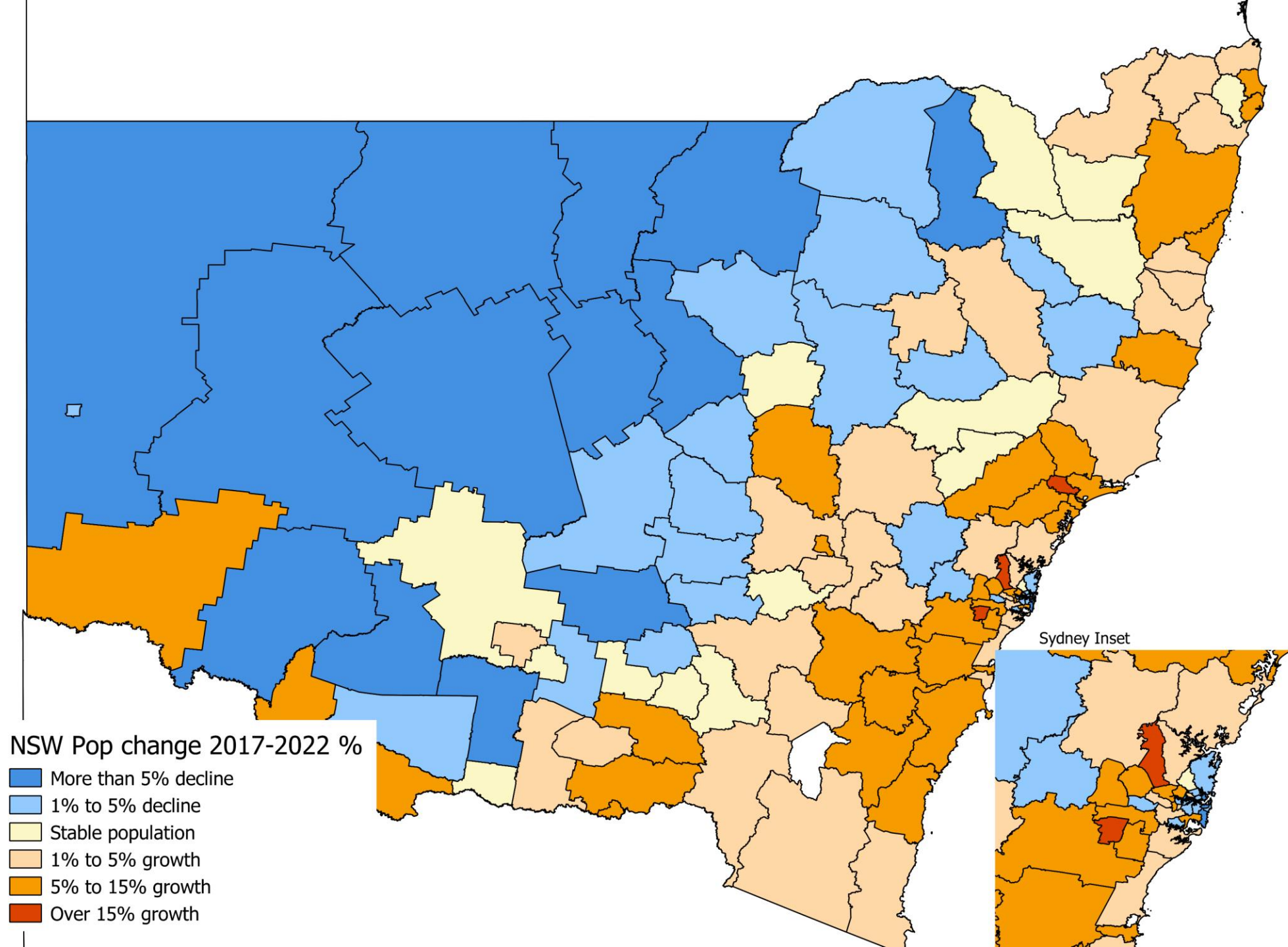
Net interstate migration – NSW, 1972-2021



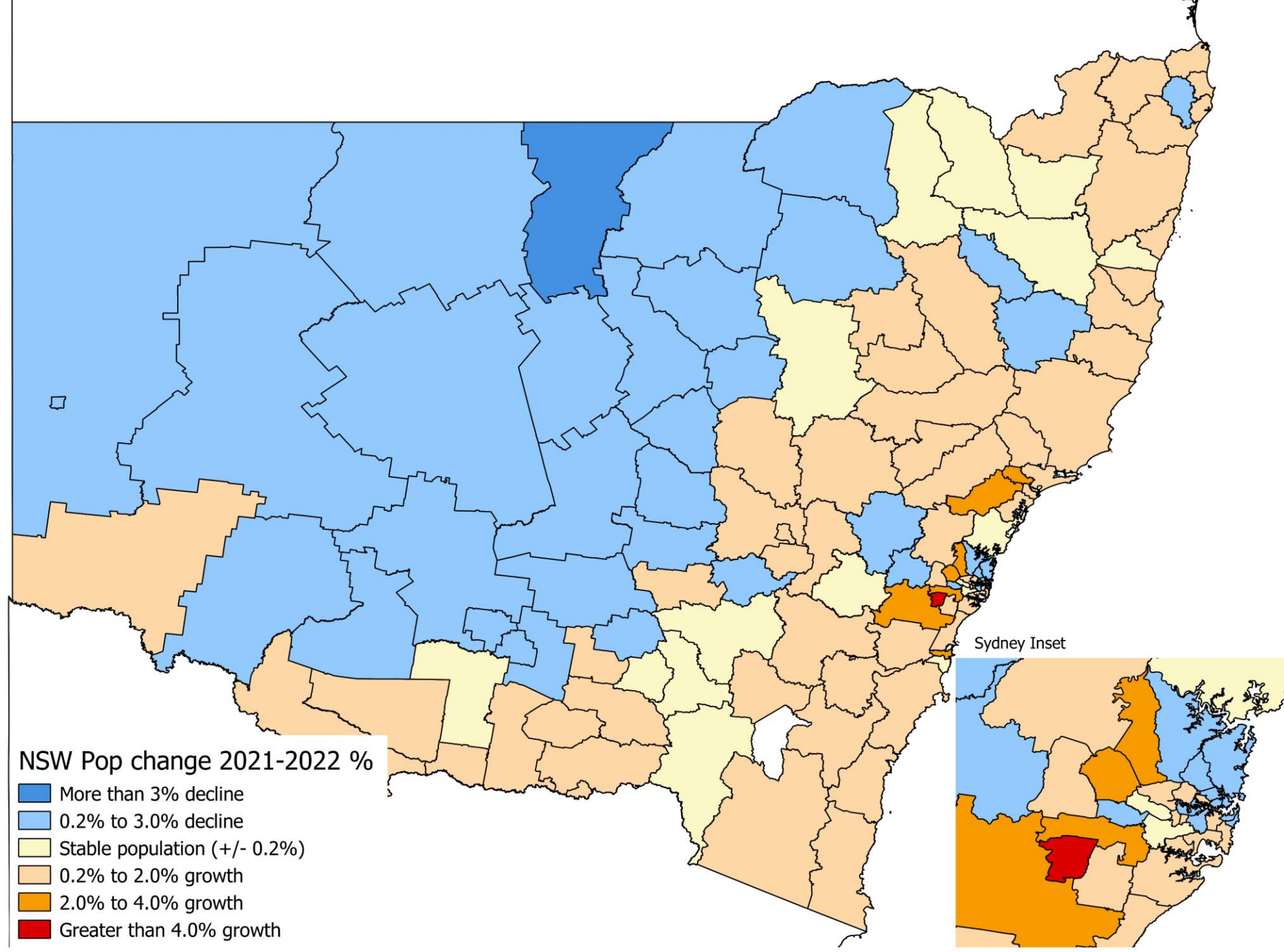
This is the strongest trend in NSW – substantial movement out to (mainly) Queensland and accelerating after lockdowns – 2022 was a record net migration loss (but moderating towards the end of the financial year after lockdowns ended).

There is also a strong movement out of Sydney to the urban fringe and to Regional NSW, with the widespread availability of Work From Home.

NSW population estimate is now very close to the Census count because so many more people were counted at home due to lockdowns. For most areas, the Census count has grown more than the population, and Willoughby is no exception. In fact the ABS now says that Willoughby had negative population growth over 5 years (all due to the last 2) yet the Census count actually increased, with fewer people overseas. Dwelling growth is higher again but average household size declined and there were more unoccupied dwellings, with less visitors staying in the area over the COVID lockdown period.

Thought not losing population at the same rate as the pandemic, the latest figures show that Willoughby continued to decline in population in 2021-22. The components of change show that this is entirely due to continued migration outward to other parts of Australia.

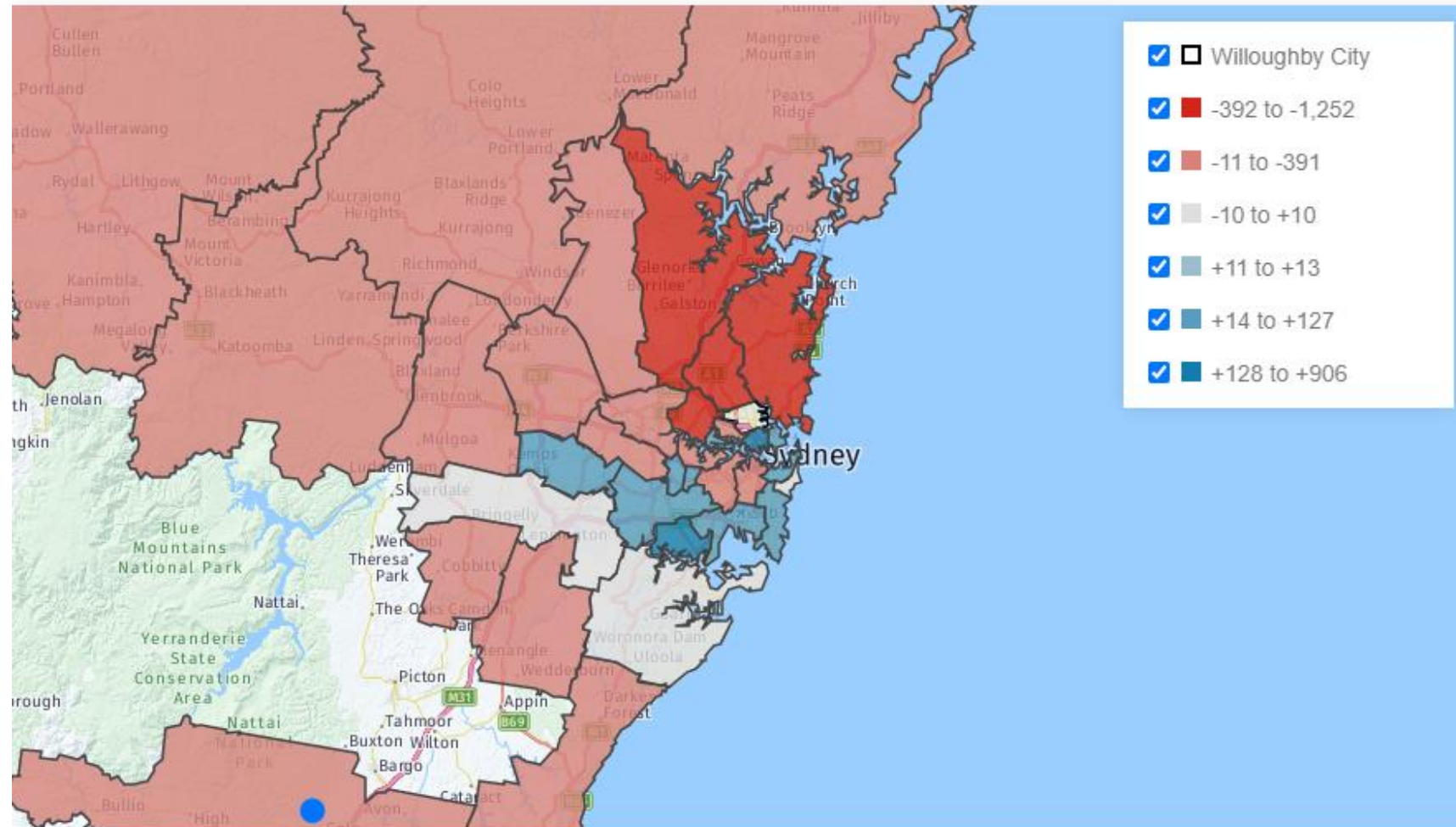
Migration (5 yearly)

For Willoughby, most migration is within a corridor, from central Sydney towards the north Shore and Central Coast. There is a large net loss in this direction, as well as further north to coastal areas of NSW and South East Queensland.

Net migration by age group 2021

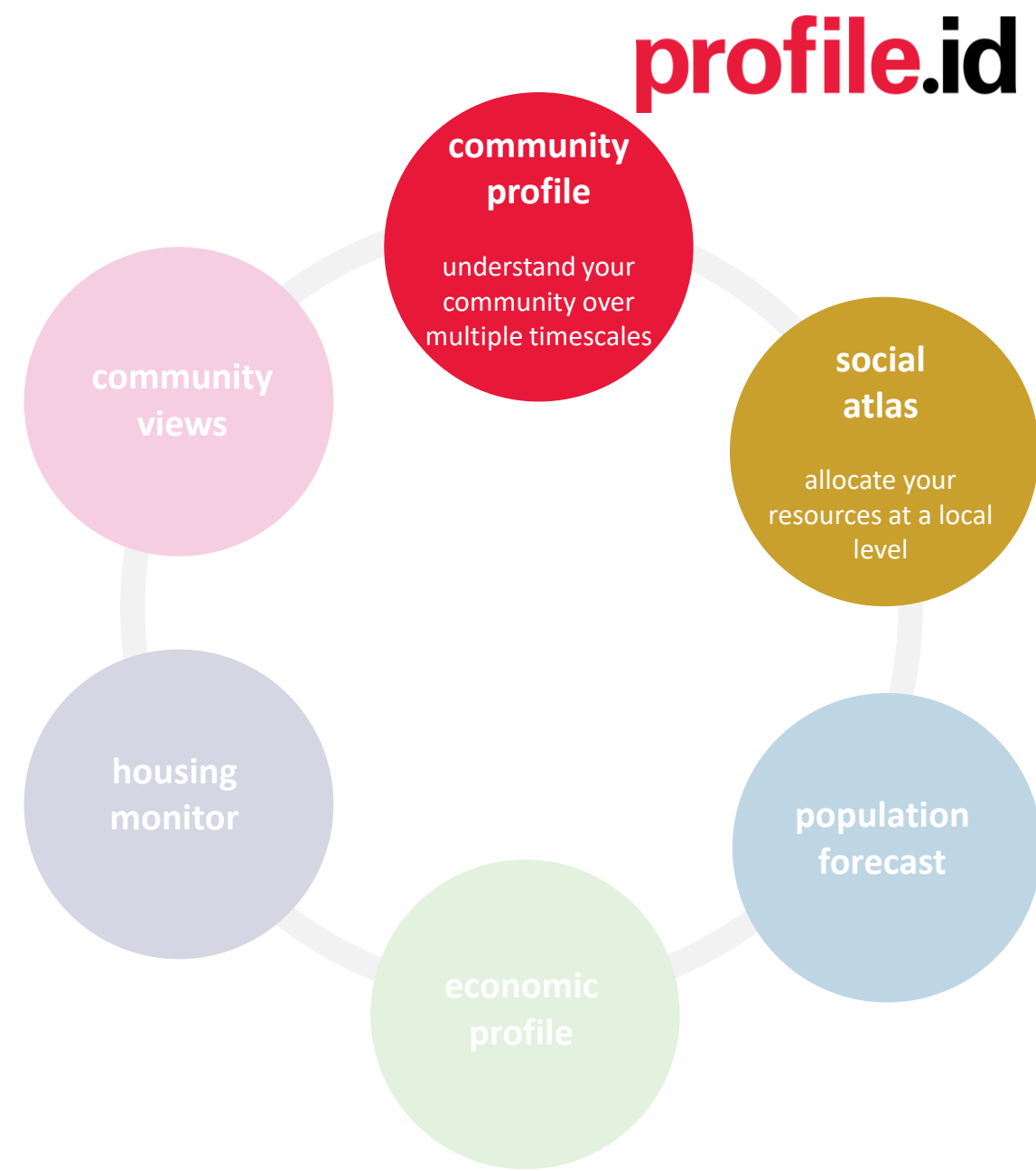

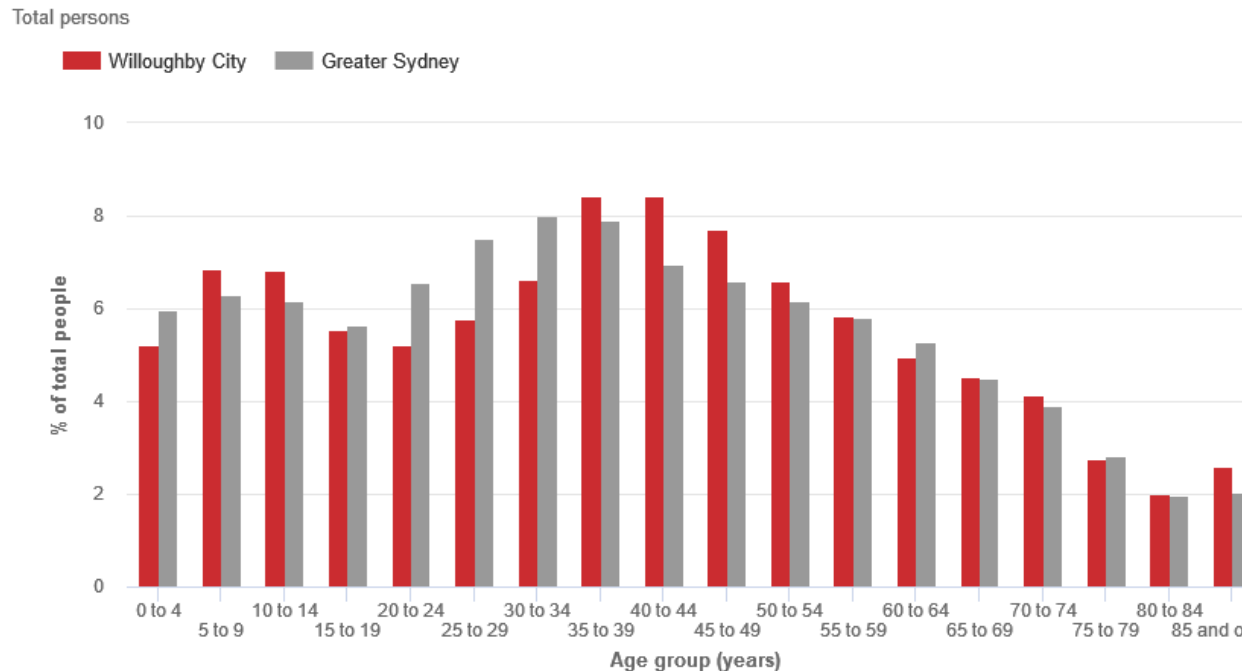

Willoughby City Council Age Structure 2021

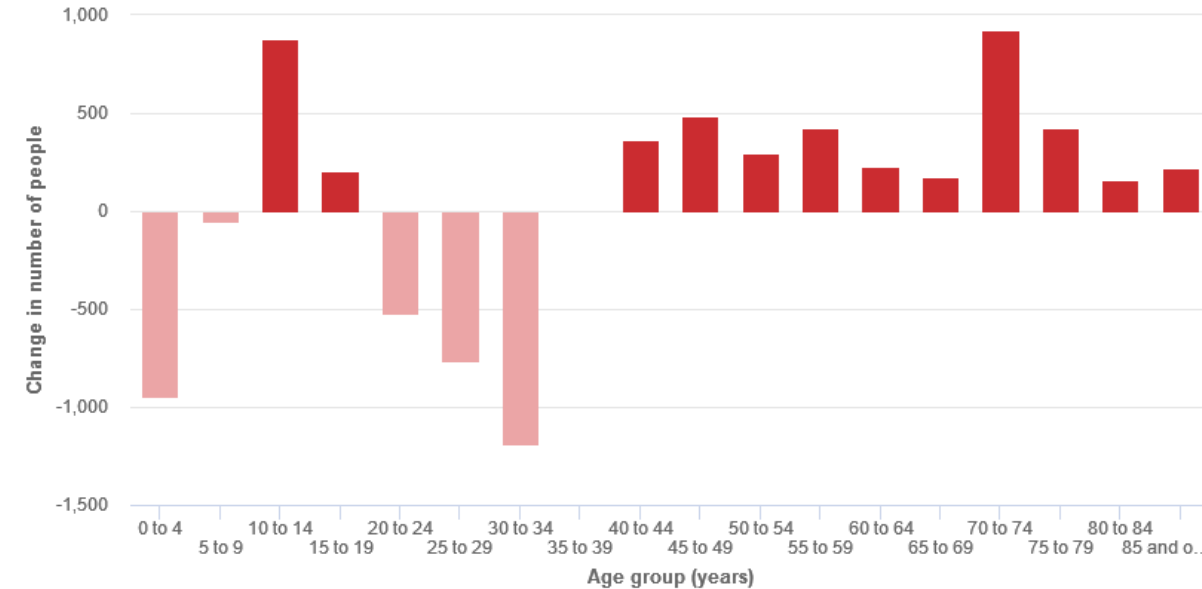
Age structure - five year age groups, 2021

Willoughby City - Total persons



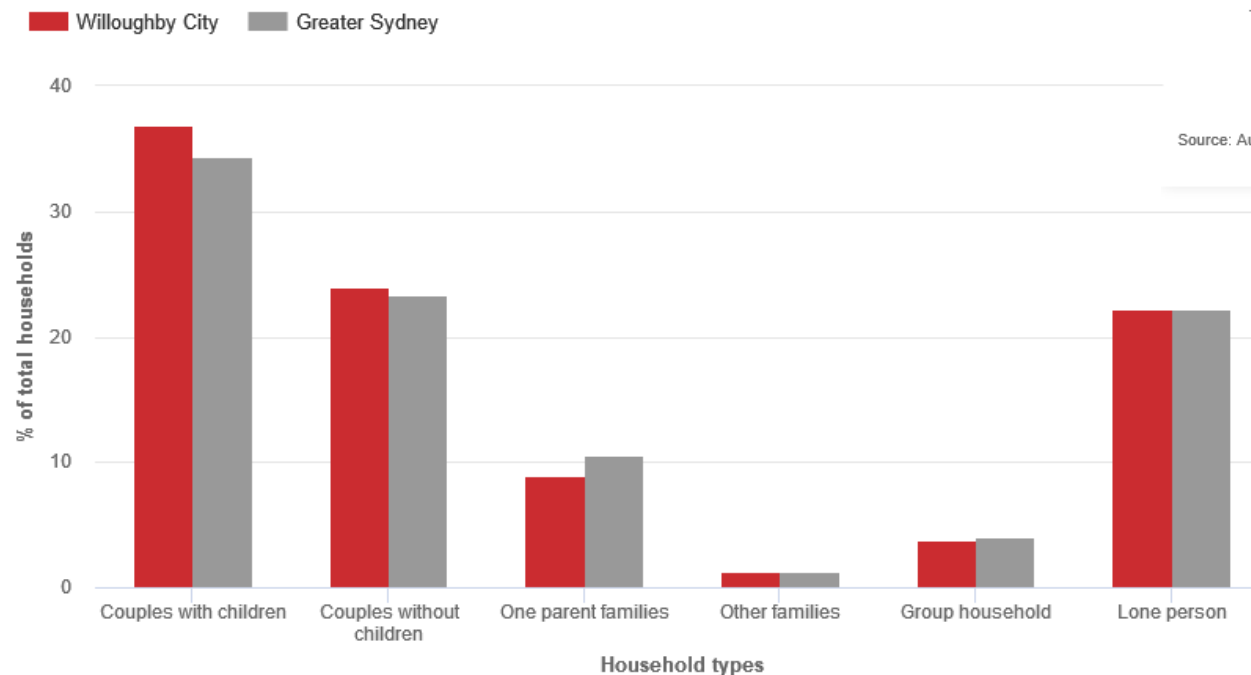

Willoughby has an age structure similar to Sydney overall, but with a few more families and older children, as well as a few more elderly. The median age of 39 has aged 2 years in the past 5, and most of the population growth has been among older children, and baby boomers ageing into their 70s, while families with young children declined.

Family households are dominant, particularly those with children

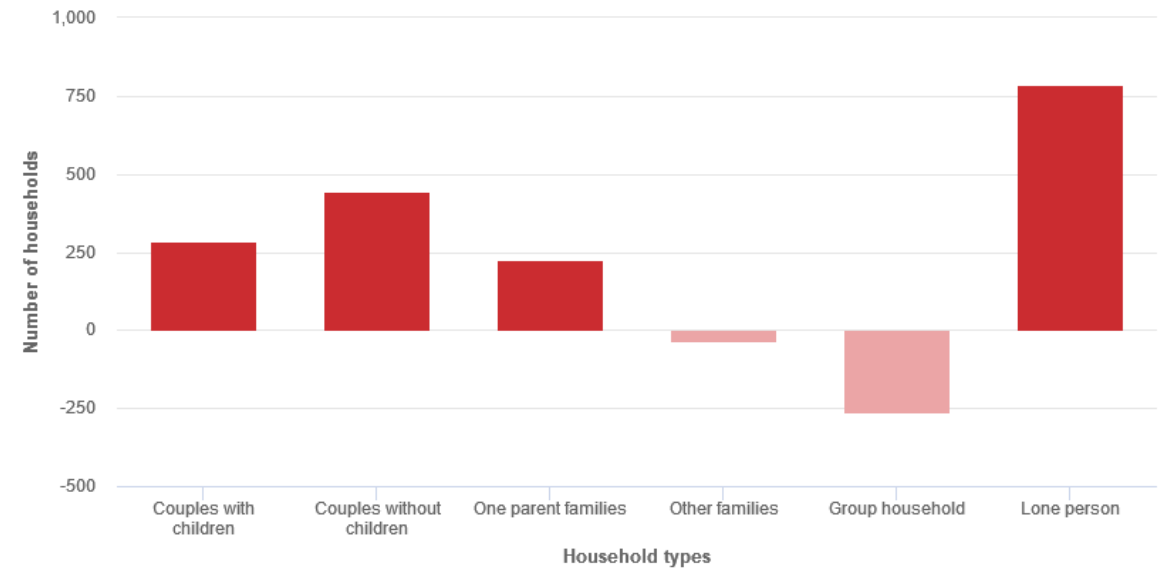
Household type, 2021

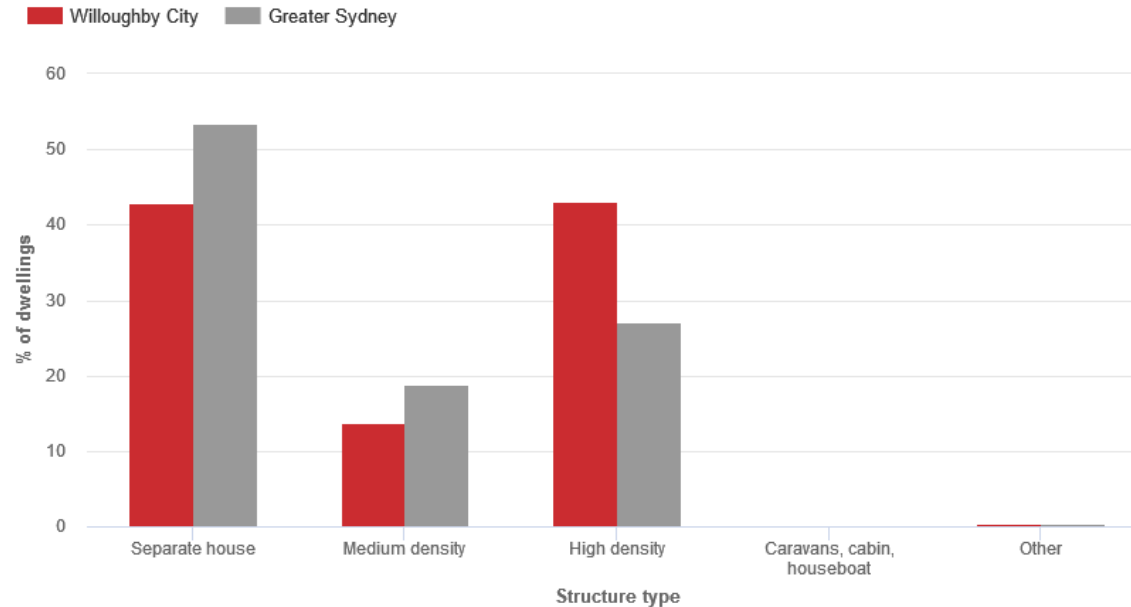

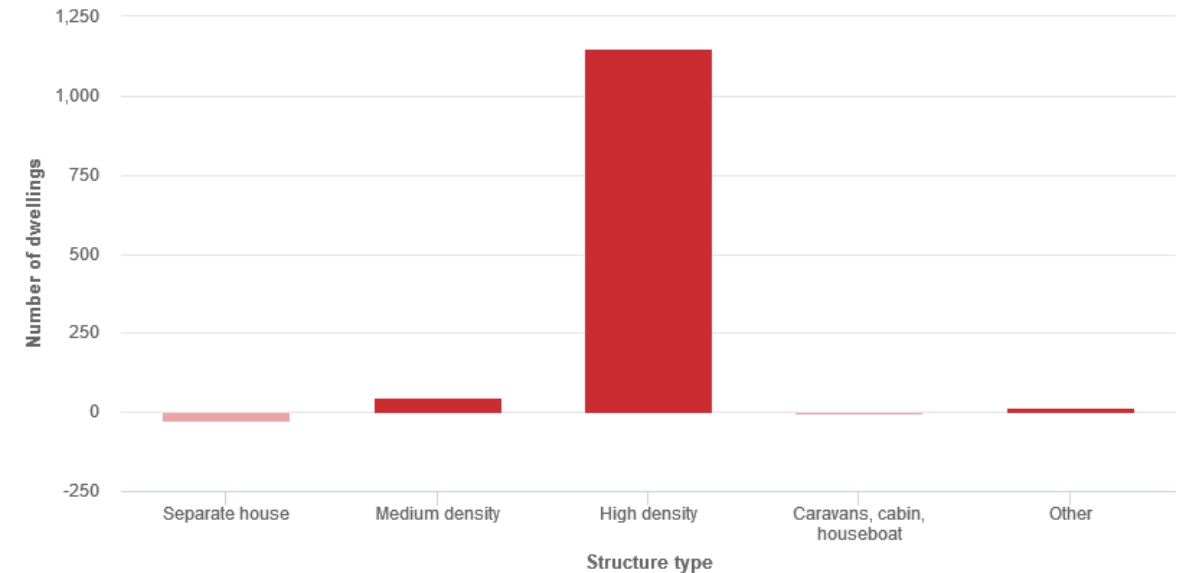
Dwelling structure, 2021

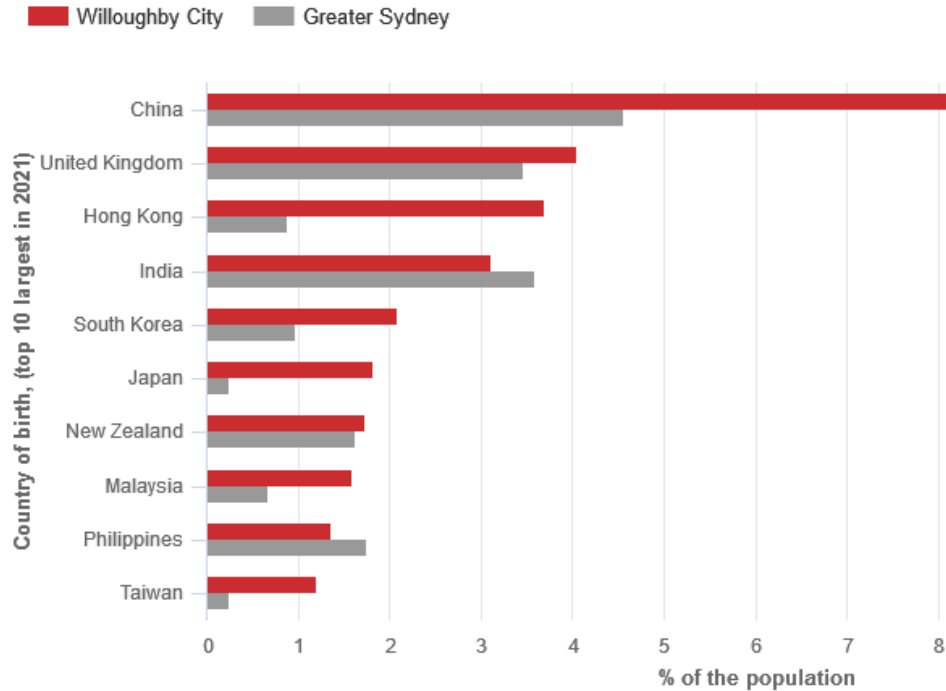
Full home ownership is quite high, with a slightly older population contributing to this. But renting has increased the most in the last 5 years.

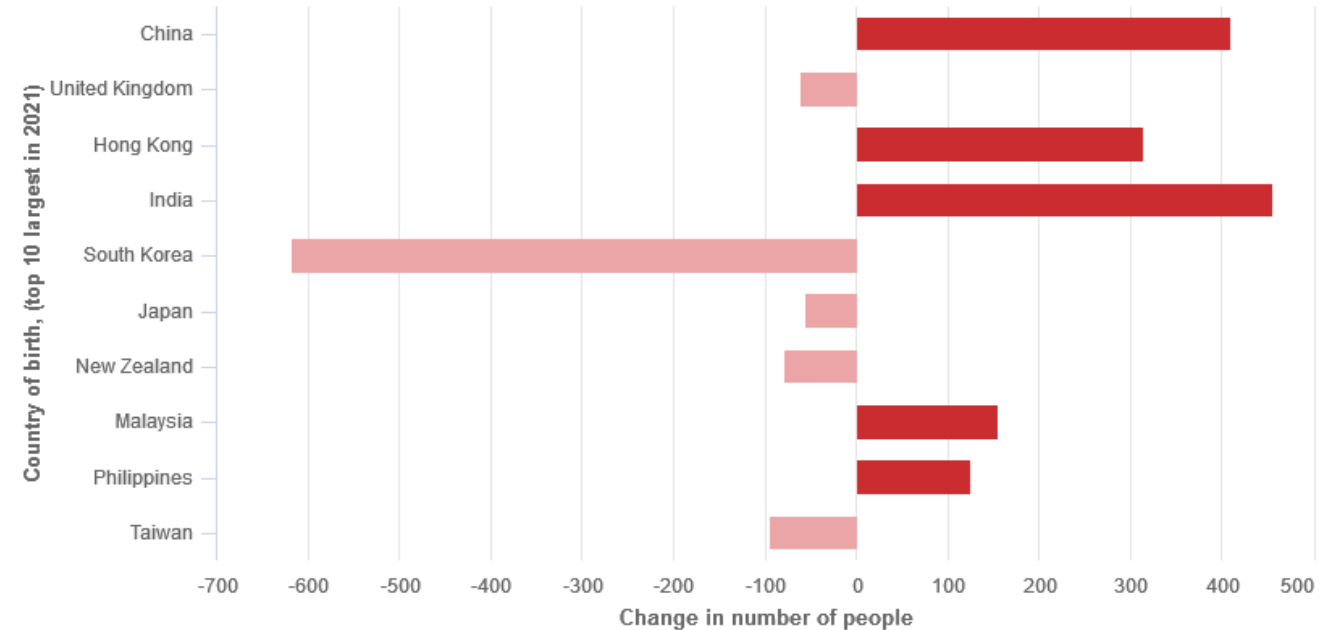
Countries of Birth

Change in birthplace, 2016 to 2021

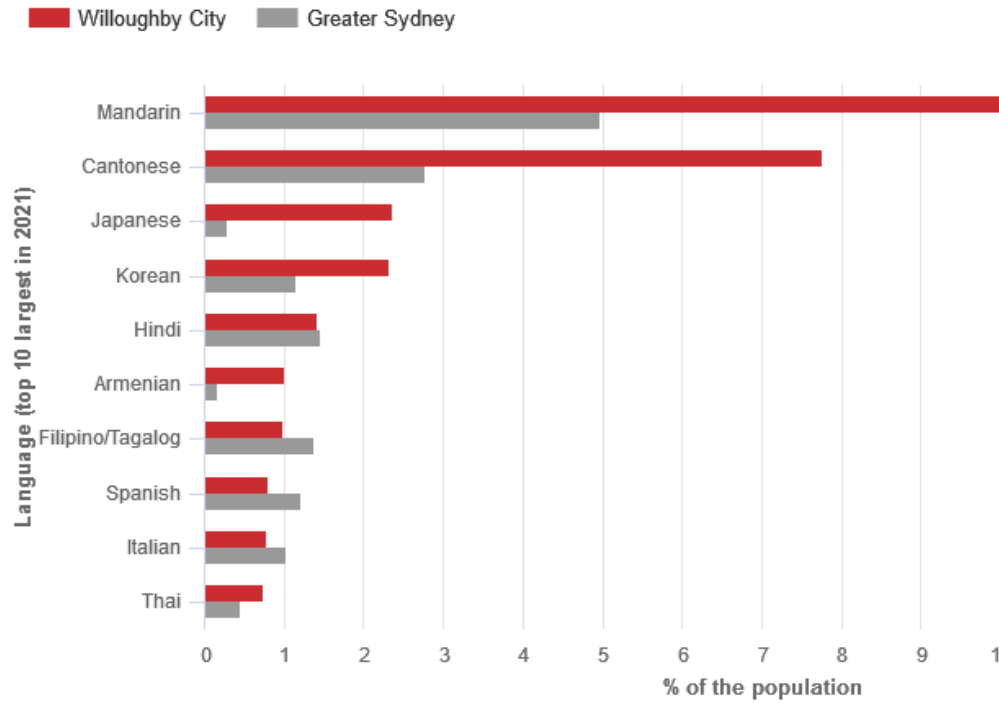

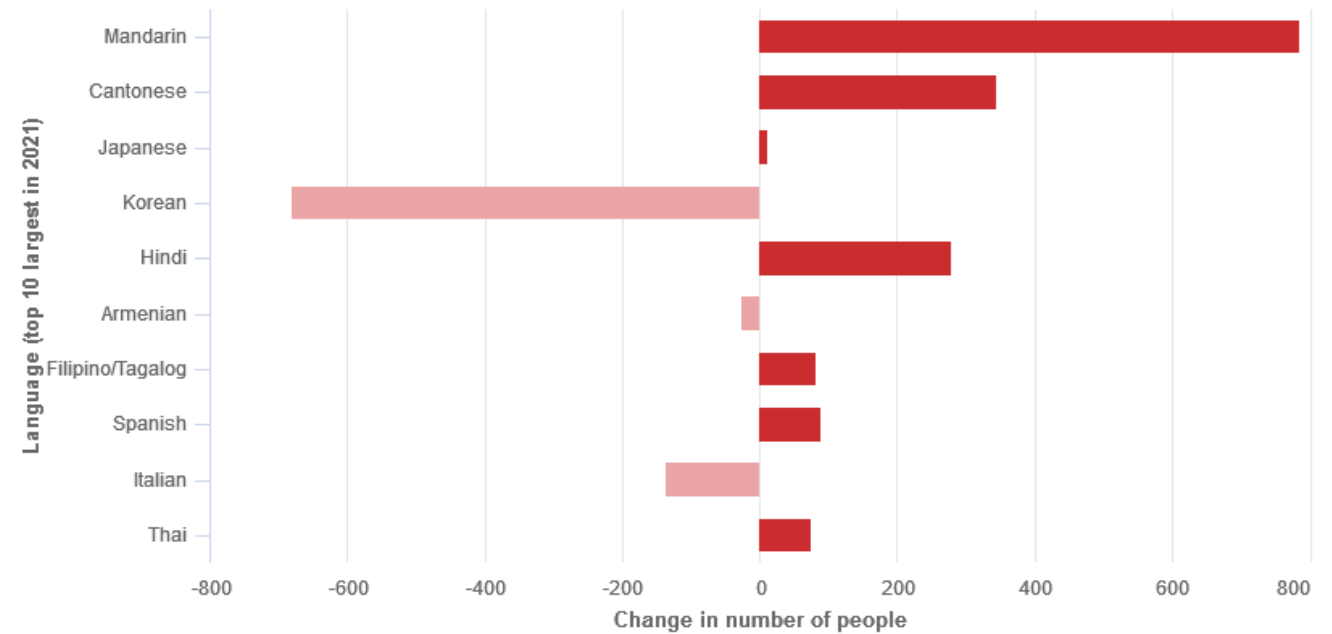
Language spoken at home, 2021

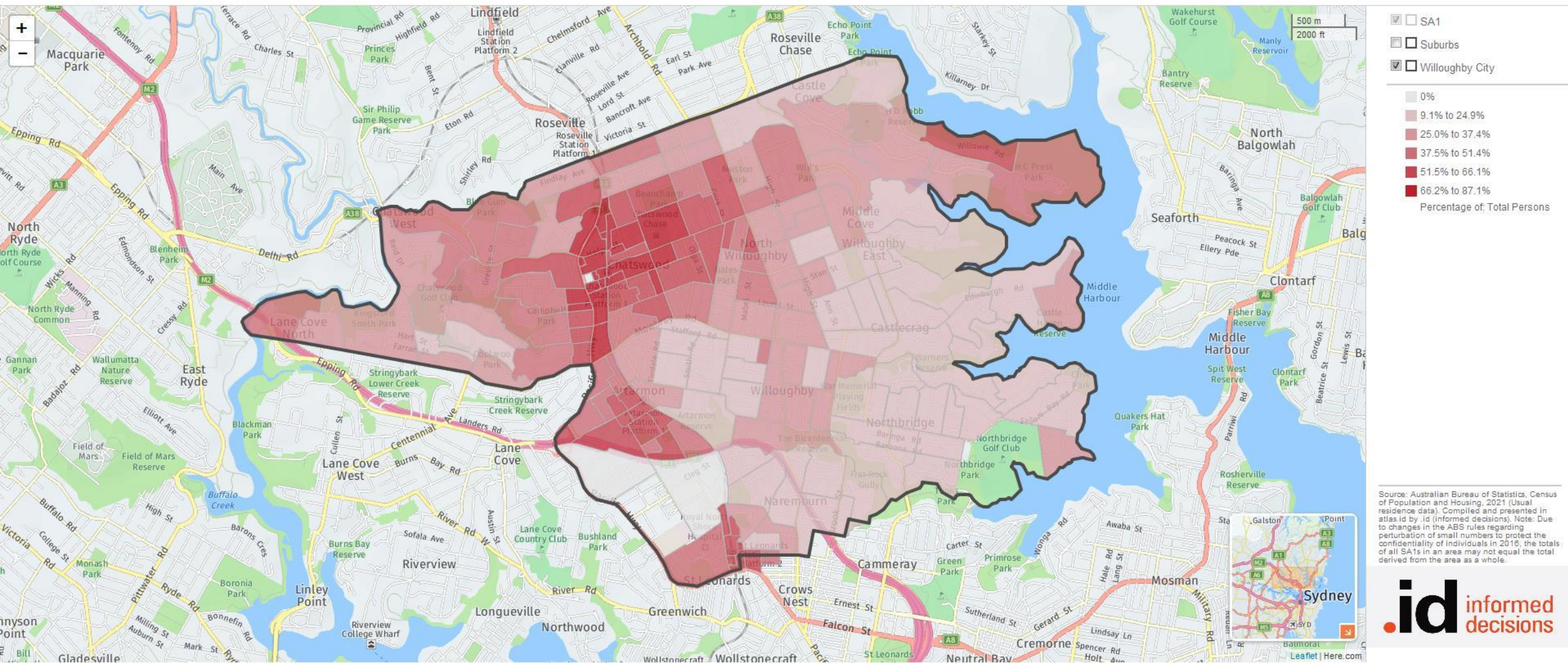
Change in language spoken at home, 2016 to 2021

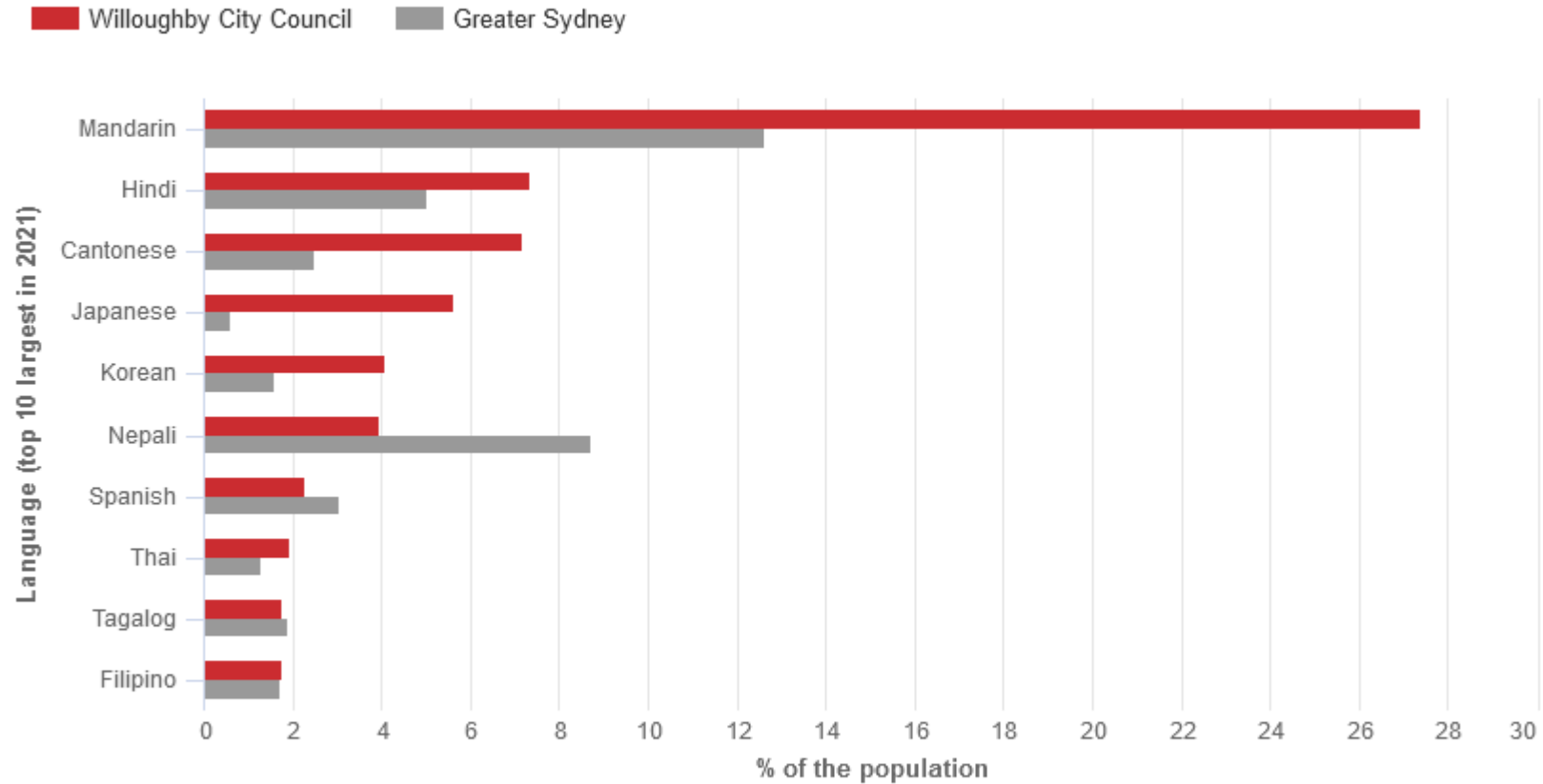

Recent arrivals



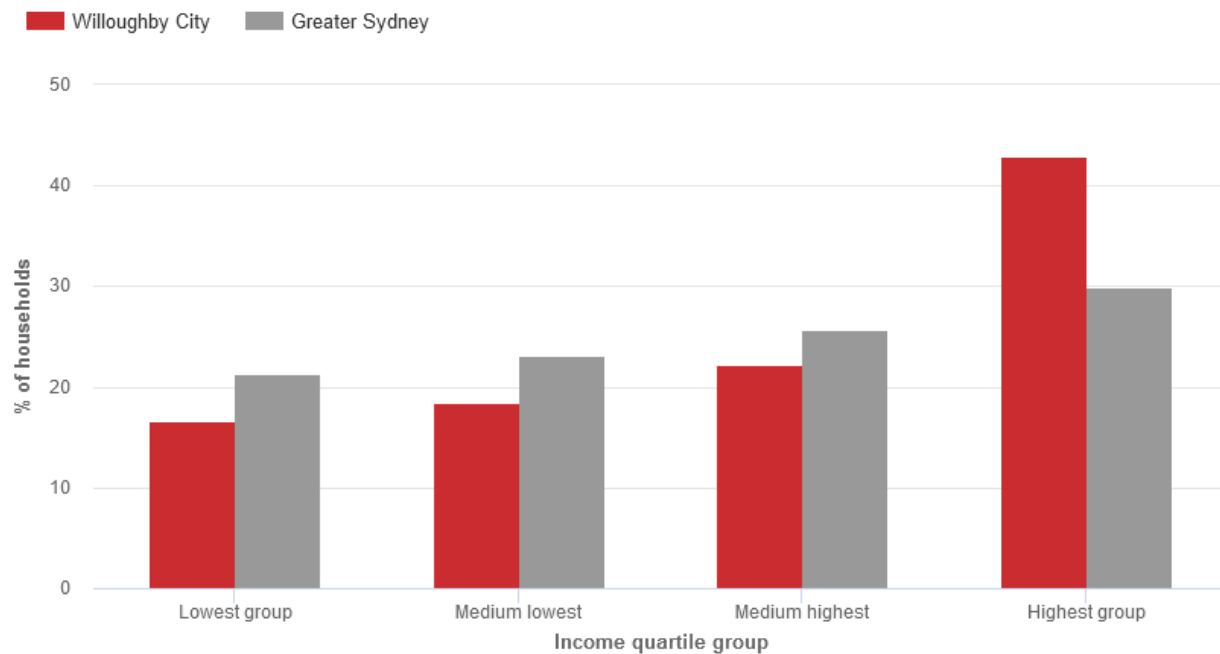

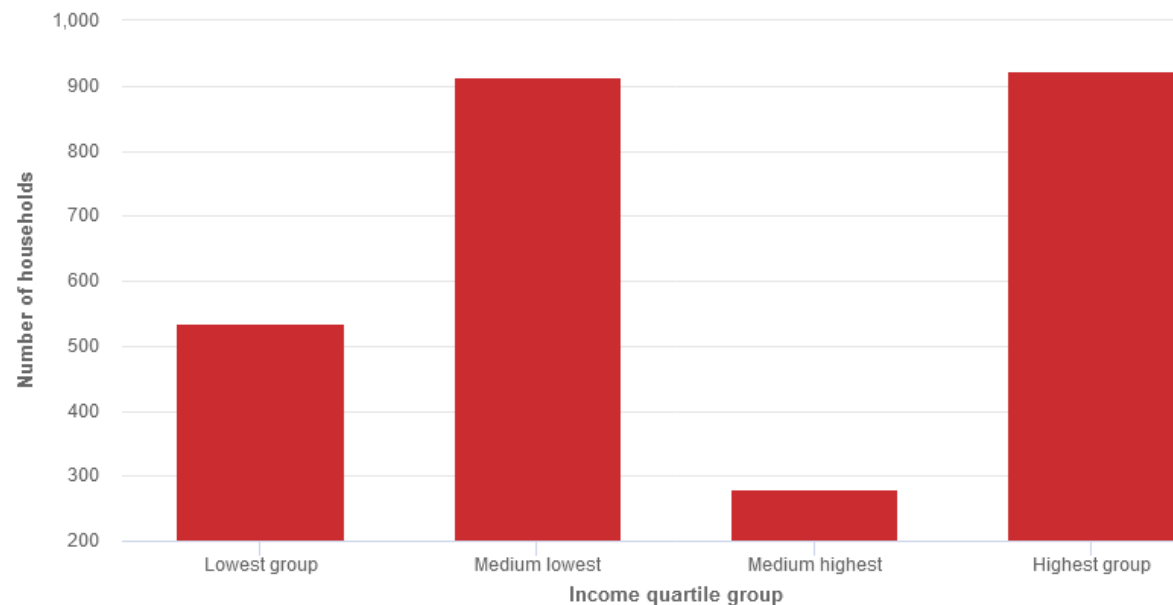
Household income quartiles, 2021

Change in household income quartile, 2016 to 2021

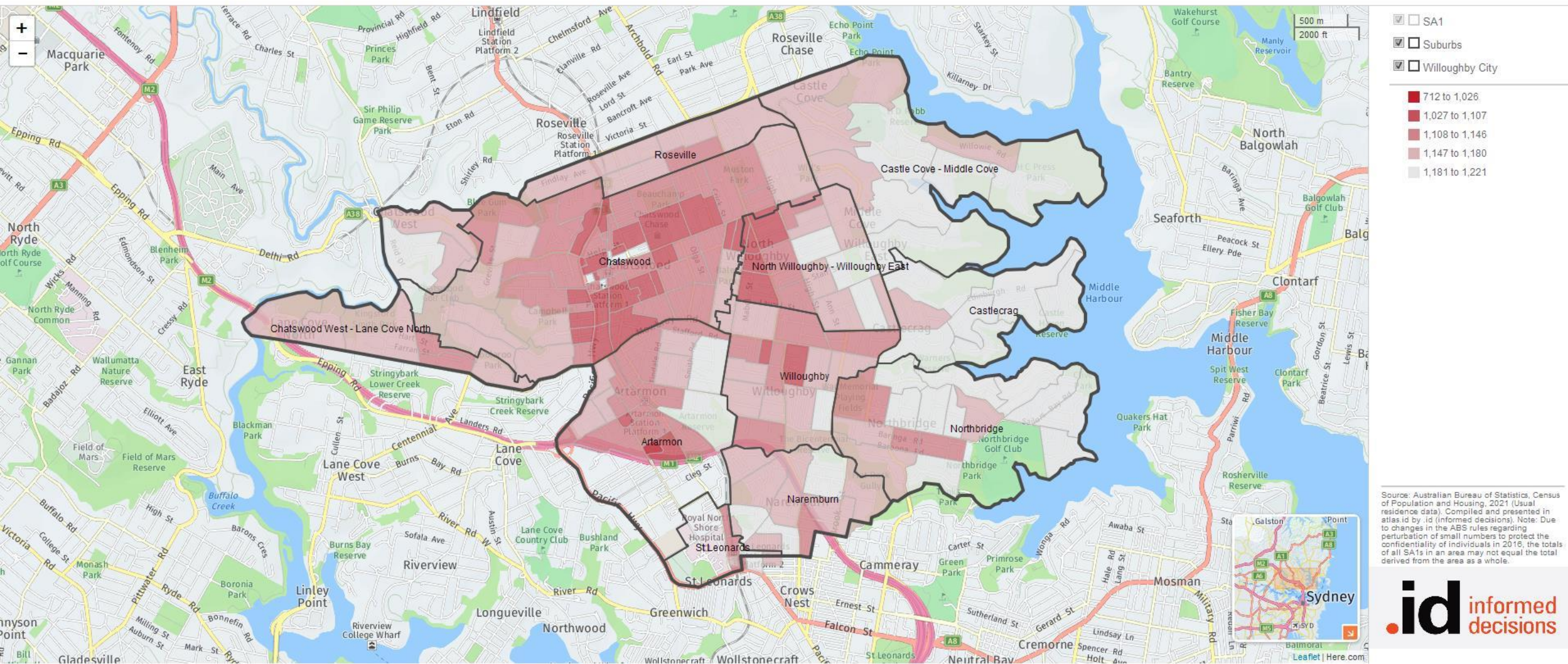

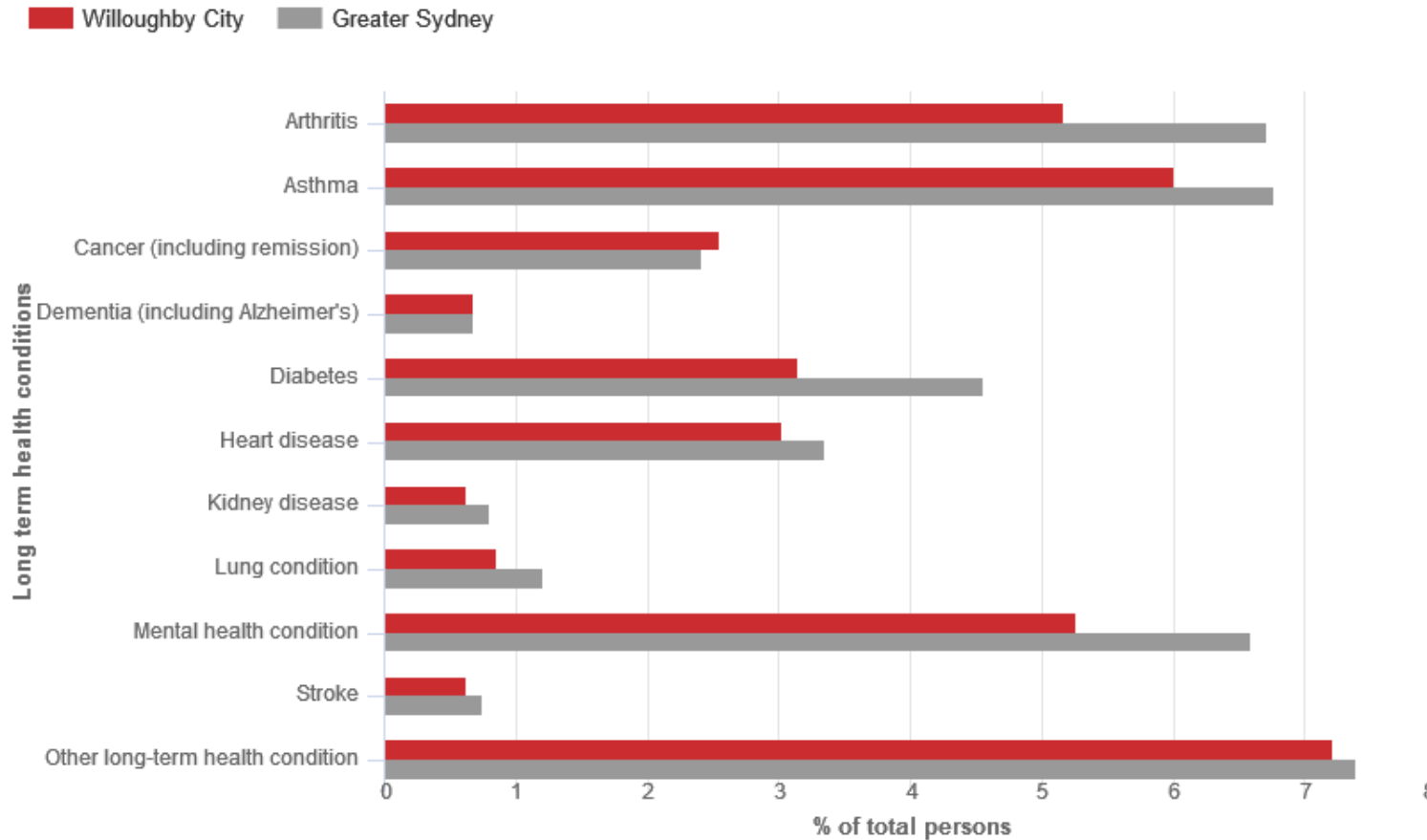
SEIFA Index of Advantage/Disadvantage

The new Census topic sheds a light on the number of people living with a chronic health issue.

Willoughby has a relatively low rate of all health conditions, with 24.8% of the population reporting at least one condition. Lower than the state average of 30.9%.

The rate of cancer is a little higher.

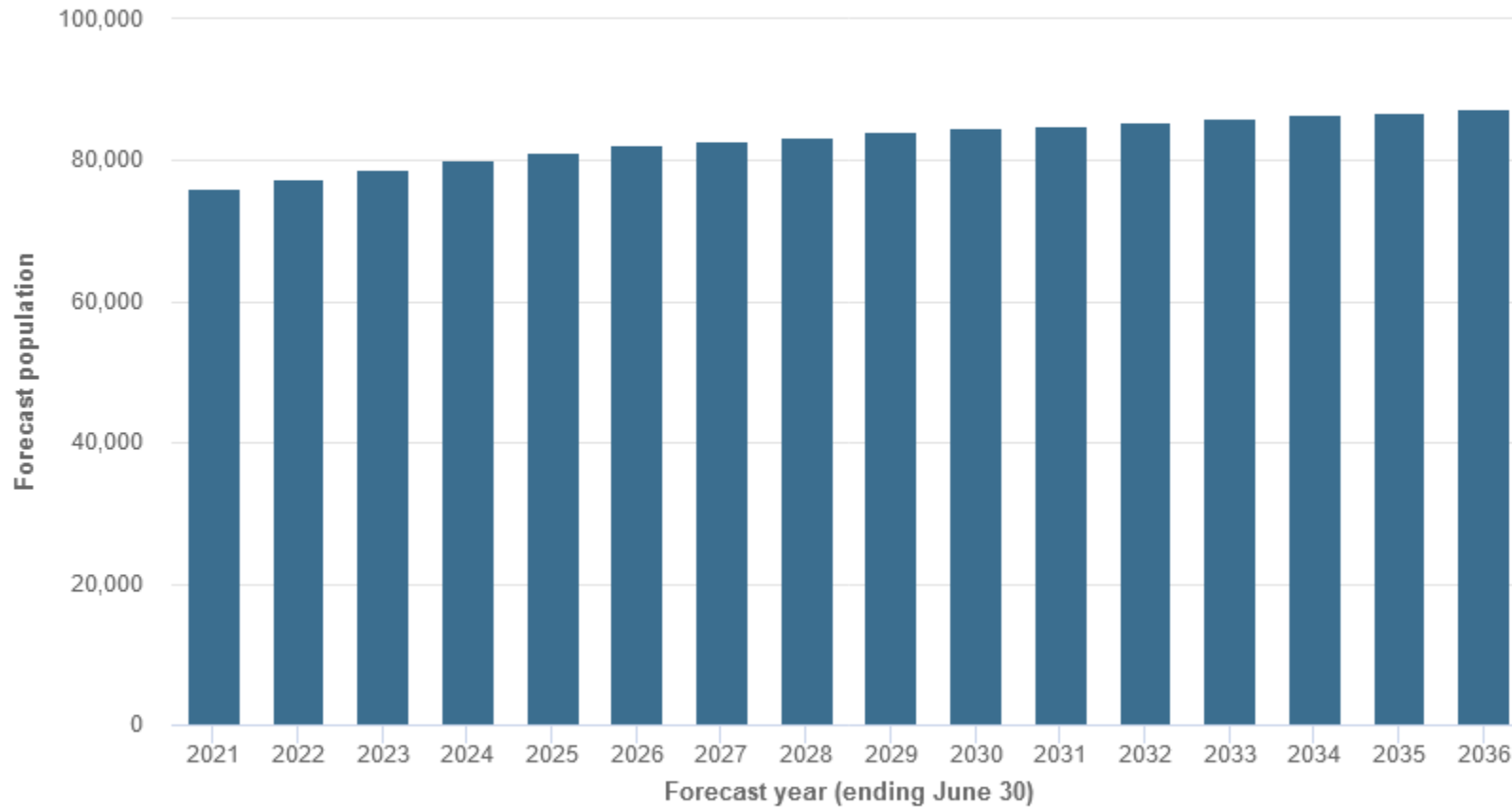

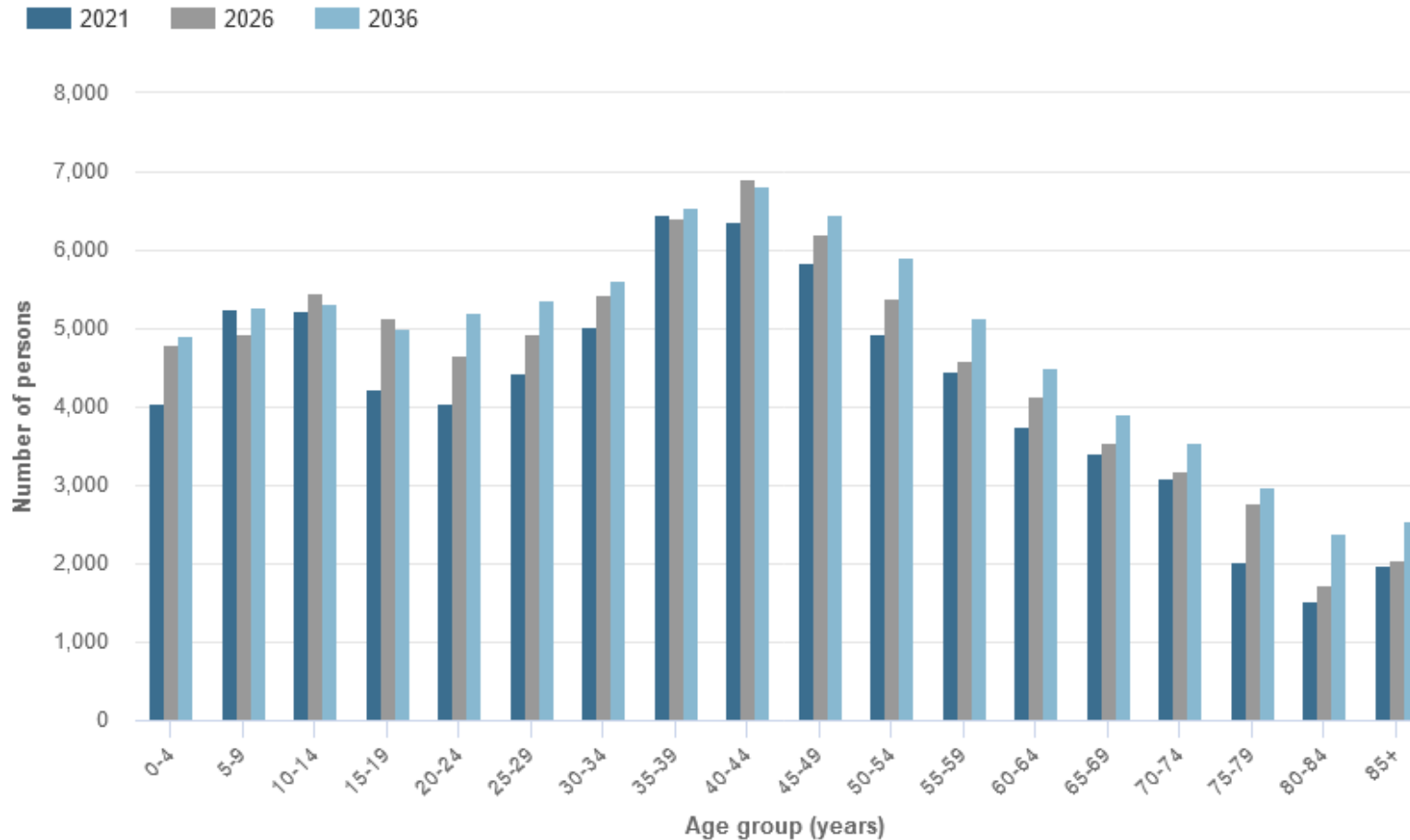

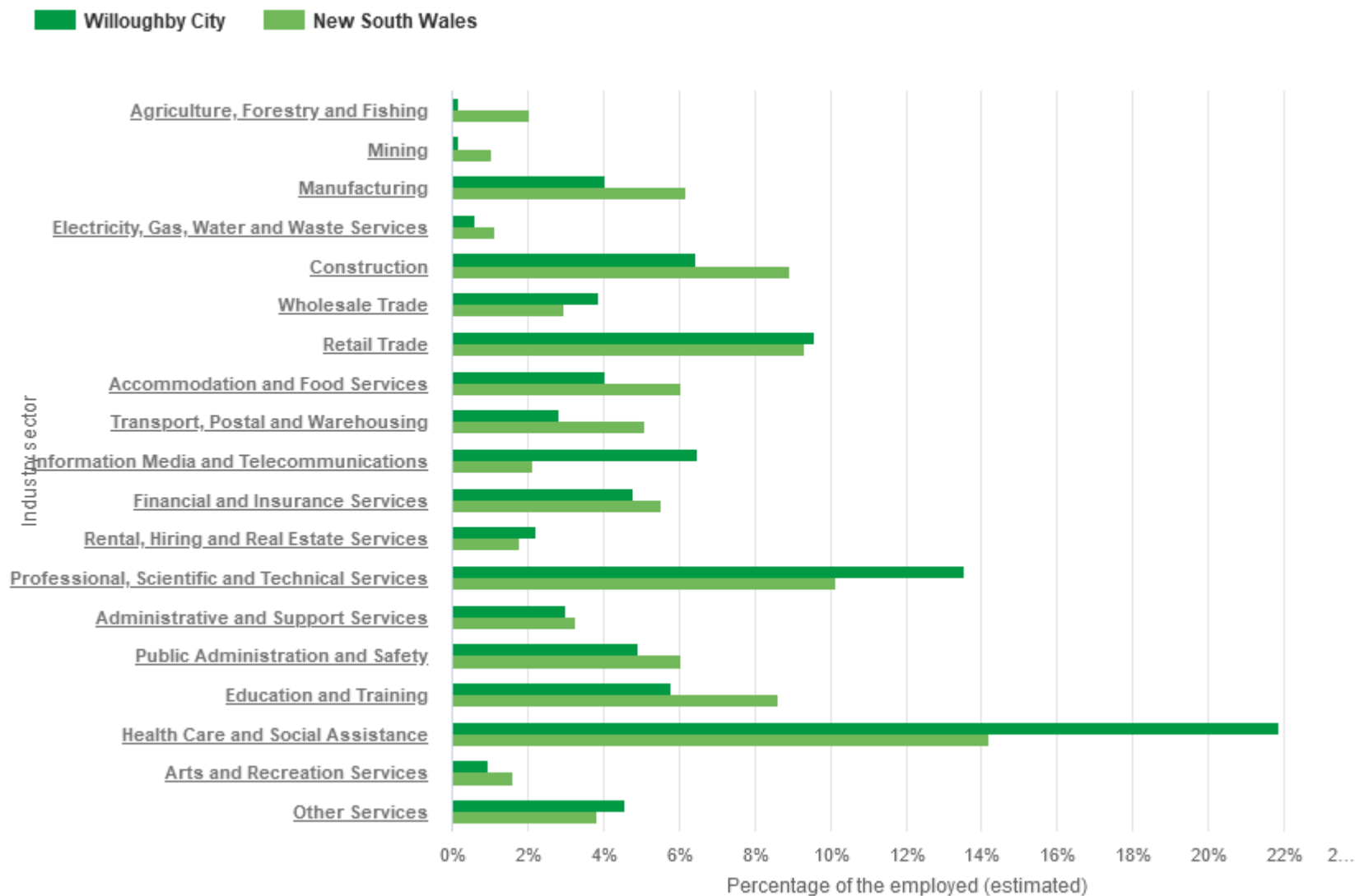

Employment (total) by industry 2021/22



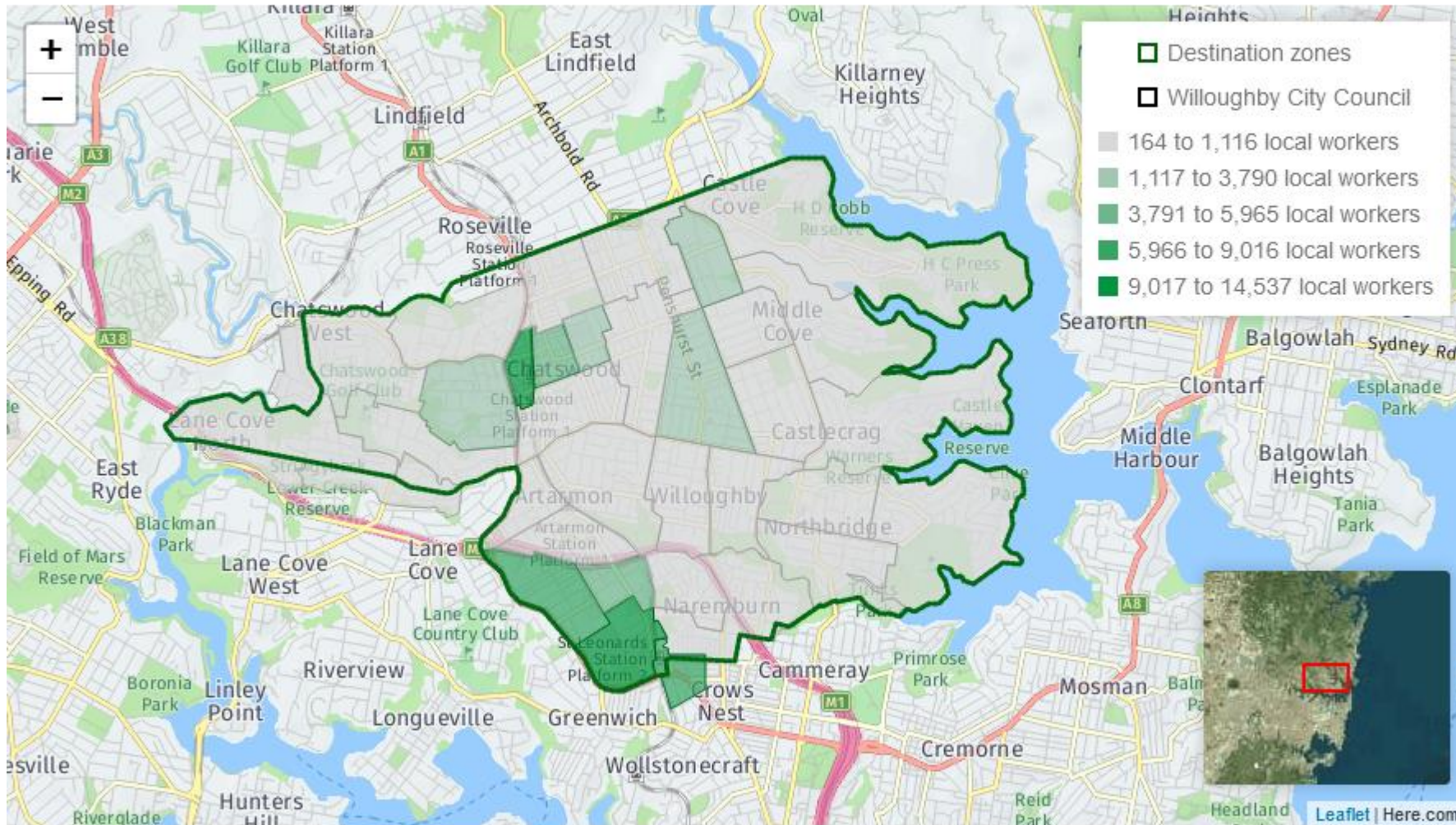
Willoughby's \$12.4 billion economy employs about 70,000 people, with the largest share in Health Care and Social Assistance, and Professional, Scientific and Technical services.

Information, Media and Telecommunications has the largest location quotient, indicating it's an unusual specialty industry in Willoughby.

Willoughby City Council - Employment locations - Number of local workers 2021



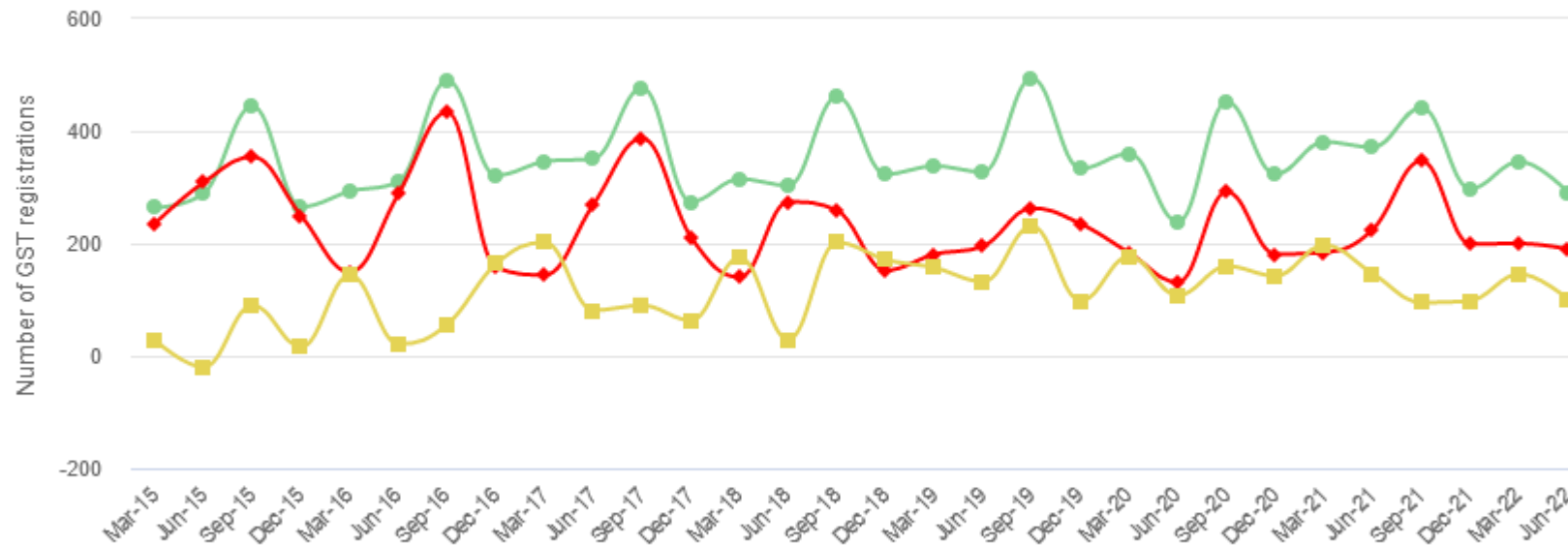
Census shows most of the jobs are in two nodes – Chatswood CBD and St Leonards.

Over 14,000 registered and active businesses with consistent growth every quarter in the registered numbers.

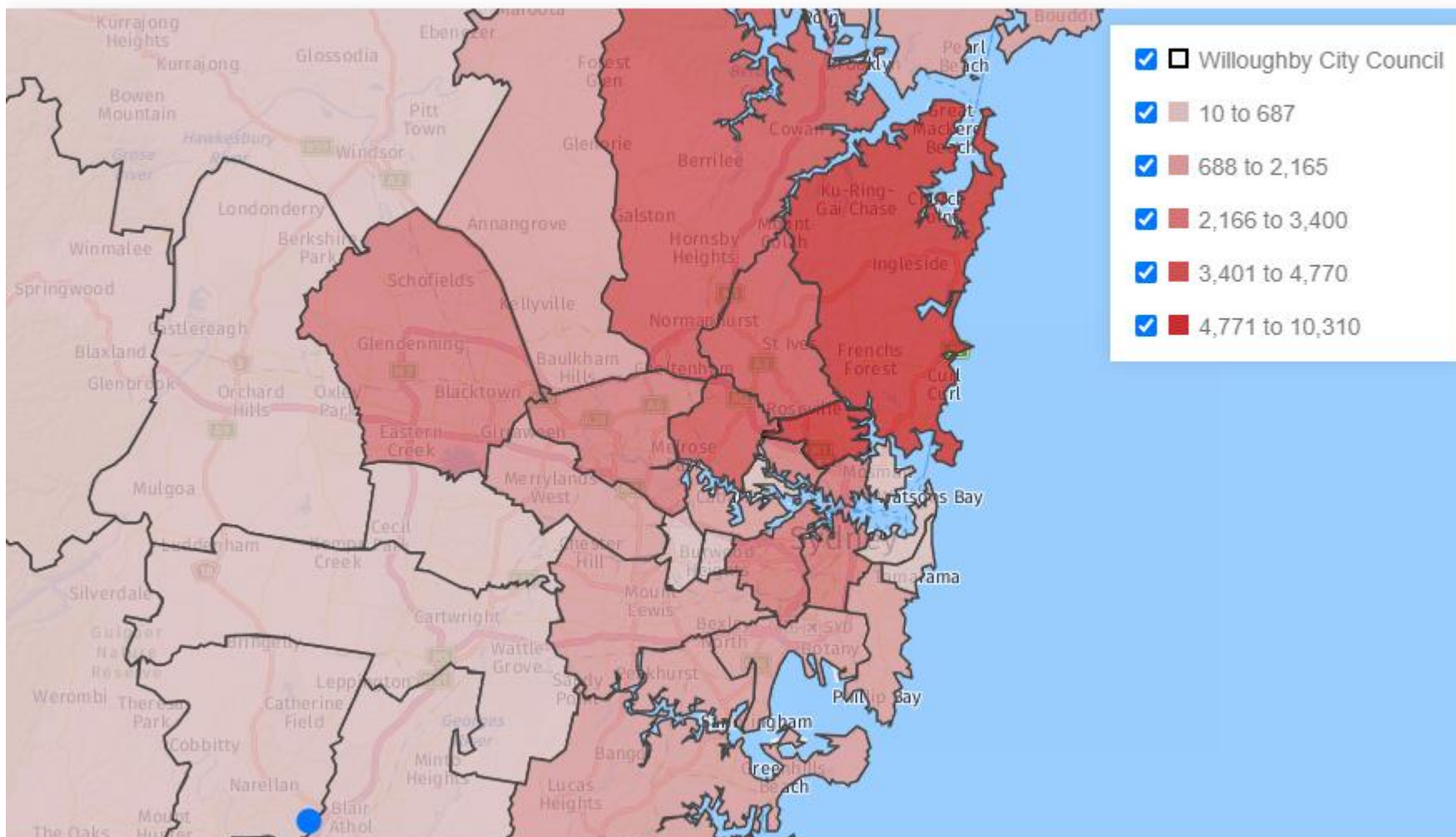

The Census recorded almost 63,000 workers with jobs in Willoughby. This is an undercount, compared to the modelled estimates.

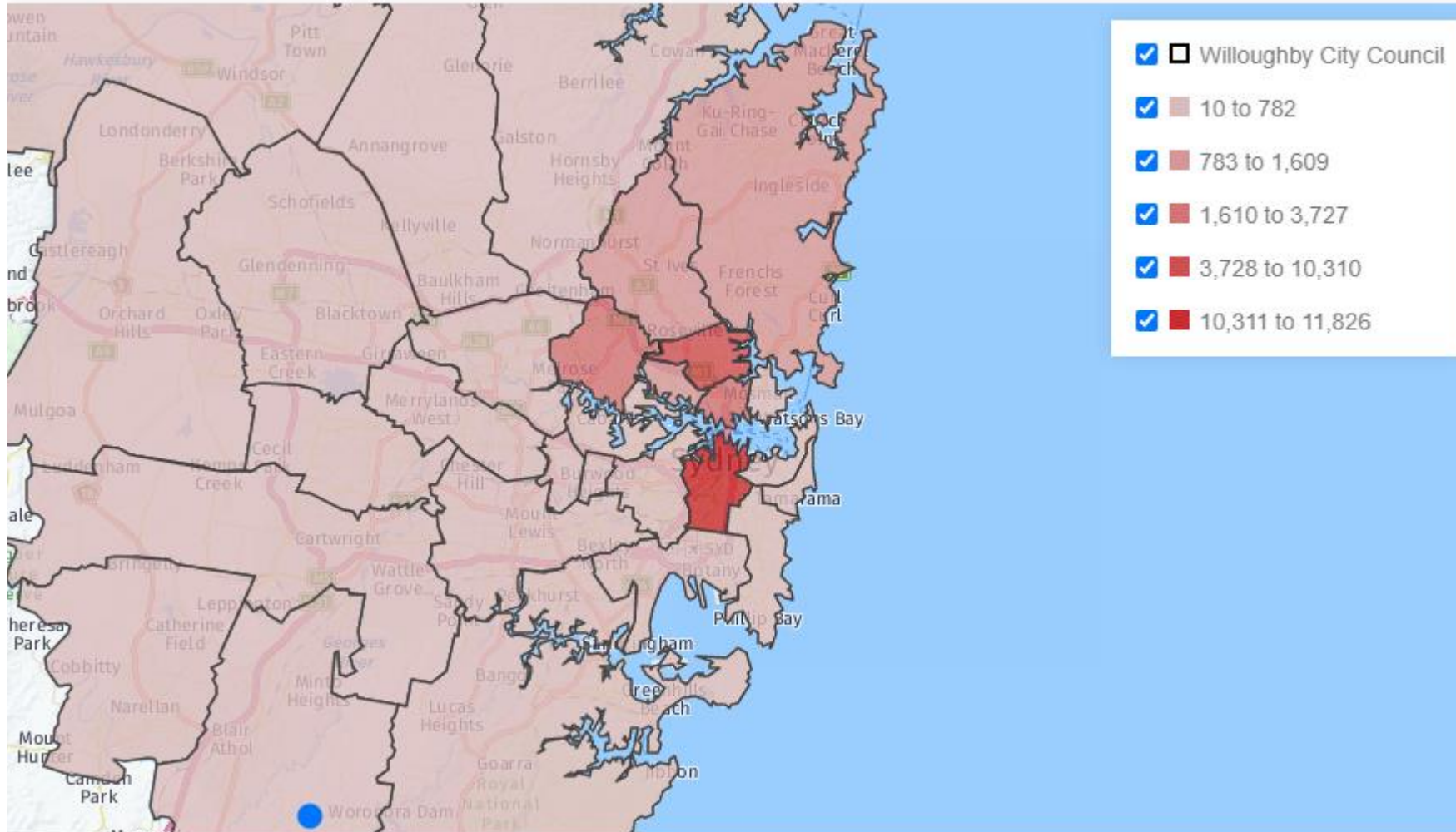
Only 16.4% live in Willoughby.

There were fewer employed residents, Census recorded just over 37,000 of those. Of those 28% had a job in the Willoughby LGA.

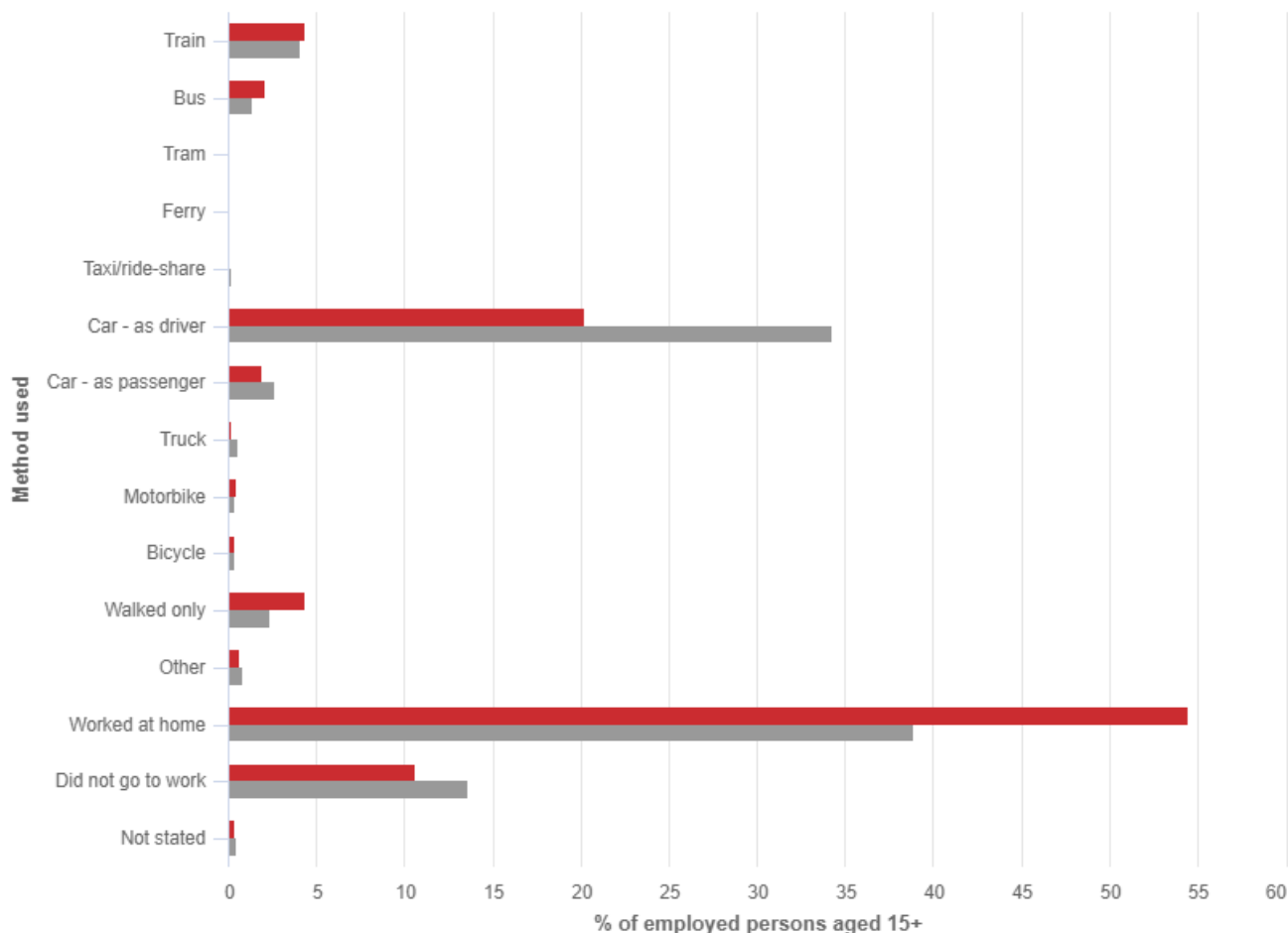
32% worked in the City of Sydney and another 10% in North Sydney.

With Census conducted in Sydney's lockdown, Willoughby had one of the highest WFH rates in the nation. 54.5% of resident workers worked at home on Census day.

Among the jobs located in Willoughby this was also high, though a bit lower at 42.3%.

With a large number of residents in white-collar jobs, it's likely to still be high, but won't be as high as in lockdown.
